The Rico Mine has long been forgotten, but this is the day you will be taken back to a time in Arizona history.

The vision of the Rico Mine derived from the will of one man, a Phoenix native by the name of Sam Hughes. It was in the winter of 1916, when Hughes became his own one-man mining crew. Hughes made the decision to stake claim to an area where large amounts of cinnabar (a mercury sulfide) had been discovered earlier in the year. Today, that area is known as Dreamy Draw Parkway which is tucked away in the landscape of Piestewa Peak. It was named Dreamy Draw due to the fact that after hours of working in the mine and inhaling fumes from the mercury, miners would often times appear intoxicated as they made the long stroll home down the hill. Hughes constructed a retort furnace, built a cabin, sunk a main shaft and dug a water well; this was the foundation that eventually turned into the Rico Mine, a generic name given if one did not have a wife, companion or daughter after which to name their mine.

The mining in this region came to an end after World War II as plunging prices made it extremely difficult to keep the mine's operations afloat.

The remains of the retort furnaces piers could be seen up until 1991 when construction of the Northern Avenue overpass buried them deep into the pages of history. As you dine at Rico's or the next time you are near the Dreamy Draw Parkway, take a minute to remember the old mill site.
