

## LODGE INFORMATION

The team at Freycinet Lodge is on hand to help make your experience with us truly unforgettable. Whatever your question or need, just ask one of our friendly staff and we'll do all we can to help.

## **OUR** SERVICES

- Check-in time is from 2pm, and check-out is 10am. Late check-out is subject to availability and charges may apply.
- Complimentary WiFi is available in the main Lodge building.
- Mobile phone reception is limited within the park.
   The Telstra network provides coverage in most areas, but you may wish to check coverage with your mobile provider.
- The Lodge's post box is cleared each weekday at 11am.
   Stamps are available from reception.
- Guest laundry facilities are available 24/7.
- Contact information for our after hours Emergency Duty Manager can be found just inside the Lodge's main entrance.

## OUR NATURAL ENVIRONMENT

- The park's abundant wildlife includes Bennett's and rufous wallabies, pademelons, brushtail possums, eastern quolls and a huge variety of birdlife.
- Help keep our wildlife wild. Please do not feed the animals, as this can cause them to become sick, or develop nuisance behaviours.
- To prevent wildlife from entering your cabin, please ensure windows, doors or fly screens are closed at all times.
- Many native animals are nocturnal and driving in the evening and at night can be hazardous. Please drive carefully and observe speed limits.
- Local beaches in Coles Bay are safe for swimming, although they are not patrolled. Please be aware of weather and ocean conditions when swimming.

## NATIONAL PARK PASSES

- As the Lodge is located within Freycinet National Park, a valid national parks pass per vehicle is required for all overnight guests for the duration of your stay.
- 24-hour and 8 week holiday parks passes are available for purchase at reception.
- A parks pass is not required if you're visiting the Lodge as a day visitor and will not be exploring the park.

## LOCAL SERVICES

- The holiday town of Coles Bay is a five minute drive from the Lodge.
- You'll find a convenience store (including a post office and news agency), small supermarket, café, bakery, take-away shop and tavern in the town. Fuel is available in Coles Bay.
- Water at Freycinet Lodge and Coles Bay town water is treated and is perfectly safe to drink.

# AROUND FREYCINET & BEYOND

Freycinet National Park is rich in both beauty and history. As visitors to the park, we kindly ask you to help us protect the plants, animals and Aboriginal sites within the park, to ensure they can be enjoyed for generations to come.

### FREYCINET FACTS

- Declared in 1916, Freycinet National Park is equally Tasmania's oldest and one of the most loved national parks.
- Freycinet was named after Henri and Louis Freycinet, members of French explorer Nicholas Baudin's 1802 expedition.
- The park stretches over 16,803 hectares of the Freycinet Peninsula, and is approximately 48 kilometres long and six kilometres wide.
- Freycinet Lodge nestles within the Freycinet National Park, sitting lightly among 4.53 hectares of natural, forested land.
- The rugged granite Hazards Mountains are flecked with pink feldspar, which gives the mountains their rosy tint.
- Freycinet's dazzling white beaches are comprised of quartz sand and fine silica, giving them their pure colour.

## LEAVE NOTRACE

As you explore Freycinet National Park, please help to protect this incredible wild place by following these simple minimal impact principles:

- Plan ahead and prepare Find out about the places you want to visit on your walk, prepare for the weather and always carry a map.
- Walk and camp on durable surfaces Keep to formed tracks and campsites.
- **3. Dispose of waste properly** Pack it in, pack it out! Please bring any rubbish and leftover food with you when you leave the park.
- **4. Leave what you find** Help protect the park's significant places by respecting Aboriginal and other cultural sites and leaving plants, rocks and other natural objects as you found them.
- **5. Use a fuel stove** No fires are allowed within the park, so please use a fuel stove if you're planning to prepare hot food or drinks during your walk.
- 6. Be considerate of your hosts and other visitors As you explore, be respectful of your fellow visitors, locals and Aboriginal culture and country.

#### HISTORY & HERITAGE When you stay at Freycinet Lodge, discovering

the fascinating history of Tasmania's east coast is as easy as stepping outside your door.

Tasmania's east coast is the traditional land of the largest of these nations, the Oyster Bay Tribe, who visited the area seasonally, with some bands living here year-round. The Freycinet Peninsula offered Aborignal people abundant food, fresh water, and sites like Moulting Lagoon and Schouten Island were particularly significant, with ready supplies of shellfish, black swan eggs and marine vegetables

Archaeological evidence of Aboriginal culture is found throughout The Freycinet Peninsula. The most visible sites are middens, which can be seen along Richardsons and Hazards beaches. These sites are comprised of shells, bone, charcoal from campfires, and artifacts such as stone tools. These are significant cultural sites, so please do not touch or disturb them as you explore the park
