




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

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

blended sheets, while the furniture is all custom-made by Henriot, one of France's oldest manufacturers, who used to create furniture for the royal court at Versailles. Done up in soft earthy tones, cool stone floors and marmorino wall finishes, you may be among the lucky few to have your own private plunge pool (so refreshing to dip into after a sunny day out soaking in Saint-Tropez's sights and sounds) or perhaps have a little patch of garden to call your very own. Pull up a sun-lounger and immediately ring for room service to send up a bottle of the local chilled rosé, ideally by Domaines Ott.

Meals at the Muse are an exercise in the finest, freshest ingredients presented with great style. Breakfast on an assortment of freshly-baked breads and other assorted *viennoiseries*, brought to your table by a wait staff in a wicker basket heaped with herbs and wild flowers. Lunch and dinner bring more substantial delights, like foie gras mousse topped, perhaps, with white

asparagus foam and parmesan crisps, saddle of lamb with rosemary jus and fresh vegetables, stuffed Provençal-style baby squid and John Dory served on a bed of artichokes á la Barigoule. You must, of course, always save room for dessert while in France and the Muse Saint Tropez is no exception. Sweet treats include an assortment of sugary delights, like apple and almond pie, as well as a selection of ice creams from Barbarac, the most famous ice cream and sorbet shop in Saint-Tropez and particularly famous for French-inspired flavours like macaron, tarte citron, canelé (the famous Bordelaise pastry) and speculoos – a famous spiced rusk-like biscuit.

To work off the fabulous meals you'd inevitably enjoy here, the azure-hued swimming pool is conveniently located right next to the dining room and few pleasures beat swimming leisurely laps before retreating to a nearby cabana. As you relax with a cocktail, feast your eyes

on the iconic *pin parasol* (umbrella pine) trees in the distance or alstroemeria arrangements found everywhere you look. For nature lovers, the Muse's gardens are particularly enchanting. Designed by celebrated landscape architect Sophie Agata Ambroise, the talent behind The Bulgari Hotel in Milan, the gardens span three acres and serve as a restorative oasis of serenity. If you have a poetic soul or wish to capture the colours of the land on canvas, we can't think of a better place of inspiration.

Should you wish to wander the town and its surrounds (and why wouldn't you?), you'd be pleased to know the hotel offers complimentary shuttle service to the city centre, the Place des Lices, La Croix de Fer and Pampelonne Beach. If you're an early riser, do visit the small but well-stocked fish market at the Porte de la Poissonerie to see what the fishermen have hauled up from the sea that morning. If you're feeling adventurous, pick out some shiny-eyed fish or luscious langoustines and work your charm on the Muse's chefs to see if they'd whip you

#### LIFE'S A BEACH

Summers in Saint-Tropez are all about its world-famous beach clubs. Here's our pick of the top four.

Moorea – Having celebrated its 60th anniversary last year, this beach club is still going strong. Quite the Pampelonne legend and very much a local institution, it is contemporary and chic, and serves up delicious Mediterranean cuisine in a restaurant set a little away from the beach club area and its tanning beds. Chemin des Moulins, Ramatuelle. 04 94 971817.

Le Club 55 – It's billionaires and the international jet-set galore at this high networth favourite. It, of course, shot to fame after having catered for the cast and crew (most notably Brigitte Bardot and Roger Vadim) of *And God Created Woman. 43 Boulevard Patch, Plage de Pampelonne. 04 94 555555.* 

Tahiti – Located just below the Camarat lighthouse, this is possibly the biggest of the Saint-Trop beach clubs. There's a large pontoon so it's particularly ideal if you plan on pulling up in your private mega-yacht. *Route de Tahiti, Ramatuelle. 04 94 971802.* 

Nikki Beach – Oozing money and beauty, Nikki Beach equals summer fun. The DJ helps keep the crowd heaving and the tables are almost always filled by beautiful blondes daintily nibbling on sushi. The hedge-funders can, meanwhile, be found busying themselves with opening magnums of champagne. Route de l'Epi, Ramatuelle. 04 94 798204.

up something special. Also, don't miss exploring the riotous and colourful market at the Place des Lices, held on Tuesday and Saturday mornings, which is studded by red and white striped umbrella-ed stalls proffering everything from confitures artisanales, jars of shiny black tapenade or anchoïade and handmade saucissons, to gleaming antique silver bric-a-brac, Baccarat crystal and even vintage Hermès and Louis Vuitton handbags. For those with a magpie-like eye, be warned it's all too easy to drop over €10,000 at this market if you're not careful. If the walking makes you peckish, grab a croissant pignons (a local crescent-shaped pastry made with pine nuts and almonds) from one of the boulangeries or look out for La Pizza du Marche, a van that sells the most delicious pizzas on market days at the Place des Lices. Continue to wander and shop as you munch away on a slice of jambon Emmental. If you're wandering the square at other times, sit

than a few bottles of Dom Pérignon, make sure you don't leave your stash of Euros in the hotel safe.

On the topic of high-end fashion, the well-dressed set would be pleased to know that, although Saint-Tropez remains a fishing town, it's not short on world-class boutiques that could rival the best of Paris and Milan. The main shopping areas are concentrated around the Place de la Garonne and the Rue Gambetta. Every desirable label may be found here, from La Martina polo tees to Vilebrequin swimmers, Dior dresses, woven leather Bottega Venetta carry-alls and Chanel handbags. But every chic visitor to Saint-Trop knows, of course, never to leave without picking up a few more pairs of spartiates Tropeziennes

down and watch the locals while away a sunny afternoon playing pétangue under the shade of plane trees or stop by one of the local cafes for a slice of Tarte Tropezienne, a round cream-filled brioche. The most famous place to indulge in this local sweet, though, would have to be at Seneguier, the famous portside café located along the Quai Jean Jaurès and a favourite of Jacques Chirac. Established in 1887, the café became a hot favourite among the fashionable set after Karl Lagerfeld chose it as the venue for his cruise collection fashion show a few years back. Sit back on one of its iconic scarlet director's chairs and order one of its famous Seneguier cocktail, made with gin, strawberry puree and champagne, and settle back to people-watch in style. A note, though - Senequier doesn't accept credit cards so, if you wish to order more

(gladiator sandals) from either K Jacques (a favourite of Madonna's) or Rondini as well as a Panama hat from Truffaux to look effortlessly chic while ensuring your face stays shaded.

There's certainly been no shortage of hype on why Saint-Trop remains the glossiest place to be come summertime. But the minute you get here and see the gleaming waters off Pampelonne Bay, walk the cobblestone shop-lined streets, party the day away at one of the achingly-hip beach clubs or even from the moment you bite into a slice of sweet, spongy tarte Tropezienne, you can't help but fall in love with the place – regardless of whether you travelled here humbly à pied or in your private mega-yacht. Saint-Tropez embraces everyone. That's something everyone who's been never forgets.

# On the Ocean

In the early hours of morning, the ocean is like gently undulating liquid glass and the horizon seems impossibly far in the distance. Waiting to take us out on a dawn cruise, drawn up photogenically on the black sand, is a shiny, white wooden outrigger canoe called a jukung. Boatman Wayan waits to welcome us on board, the white flash of his smile rivalling that of our cameras as he wishes us a bright Selamat pagi (Good morning).

We clamber over the side and take our places as Wayan holds the jukung steady with the help of his assistants. They push the boat into the ocean and, once we are afloat, Wayan hops up onto a small platform at the back, where he expertly manipulates the rudder and motor to get us going. Looking back at the beach as we head out to sea, the symmetry of the resort is apparent but it soon becomes just part of the palmlined coast, with the green mountains of Bali's jagged spine rising behind. Wayan cuts the motor and we sit absolutely still in the middle of the flat inky blue-black sea. By chance, we are looking in exactly the right direction when several fins break the surface a few metres away - dolphins, a pod of a dozen or so making their way slowly towards shore. Wayan starts the motor and we drift gently towards them. Then, as one, the dolphins arch their backs further out of the water and dive. They are gone. Wayan manoeuvres us ahead before cutting the motor again. We wait and, suddenly, they are all around us. He has anticipated their path perfectly and we sit in complete silence, just watching in awe. They move on, leaving us behind and we exchange a secret smile of an unforgettable experience shared.

As we return to shore, a light breeze ripples the ocean, but the sun is higher and we can now see through the clear water. Surfing on a ripple, Wayan guides us back onto dry land, where we thank him for such a memorable morning. Walking back to a late breakfast, we pass the beachside lawn and spy a poster, showing a plan of the resort's reefscape, with sets of masks, snorkels and fins leaning against the wall below. It was, we agree, a new adventure for the next morning.

# Under the Sea

As soon as we dipped our heads below the surface just off the beach, we saw exactly what American humorist Dave Barry meant: "When you finally see what goes on underwater, you realise that you've been missing the whole point of the ocean. Staying on the surface all the time is like going to the circus and staring at the outside of the tent."

Just below us were large coral outcrops, each an oasis of life in the desert of the sand flats and home to a host of fish, large

and small. Many had been colonised by anemones and the resident clown fish would bob and spiral up curiously towards us as we approached. Elsewhere, we saw hundreds of electric blue damselfish scurrying between small boulders and, to the west of the resort, a large area of coral, pulsating with life, covering the ocean floor. We pottered about for hours above the reef, fascinated by all the activity going on below.

# Into the Hills

A little light trekking on the slopes of Bali's central mountains was what we requested and a few minutes in the car took us to Les, a pretty hillside village with narrow lanes and numerous exotic temples. Striking out across the surrounding rice fields, we found ourselves on a path, which skirted a stream, and then climbed through plantations of banana, rambutan, jackfruit and pineapples. Meeting a woman cutting open an enormous jackfruit to expose the fruit within, we asked to taste some and she obliged. She watched as we bit into the rubbery flesh and

A kilometre or so further along the increasingly forested track, having been alerted several minutes beforehand by the steadily growing thunder of crashing water, we came upon the Yeh Mempeh Waterfall, where the river drops some 40m in a long narrow horsetail. We had brought swimsuits and climbed gingerly over the wet rocks into the shallow pool formed below the torrent. The spray was instantly cooling after our walk in

smiled broadly when she saw that we liked it.


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the midday heat from the village and we backed carefully into the waterfall to test the strength of this natural power shower: bracing but bearable.

# Culture at Home

We need not have worried that our artistic and cultural needs might not be fulfilled. Those were taken care of on a daily basis at the resort itself, with regular opportunities to learn about as well as practice Balinese crafts and customs. These included writing on *lontar* palm leaves, mixing traditional health-giving elixirs called *jamu jamu* from herbs and spices, and creating traditional offerings for the Balinese gods, small woven palm dishes containing flower petals, rice, a clove cigarette, a piece of candy and a burning incense stick.

Then, on our last evening, we were invited to watch a dance performance by a local troupe. It was astonishing to see how effortlessly young village boys and girls in t-shirts and shorts became elaborately dressed warrior princes and exotic princesses before our eyes, exhibiting discipline, poise and grace beyond their years. Flashing eyes and flirting hands accompanied the hypnotic rhythmic crash of the drums, cymbals and industrial-size xylophones of the accompanying gamelan orchestra. It was enchanting throughout, just like everything that we experienced in the past few days. Spa Village Resort Tembok, Bali more than fulfilled our expectations of the three As, so much so that we immediately planned a return. Whatever more we might want to add to our escape from the real world – scuba diving, perhaps, or even climbing a volcano – this is the place to be.

# Malacca Metaphors

Celebrated artist and conservationist Victor Chin explores history-soaked Jalan Hang Jebat in Malacca.

the East, from the 15th to 19th centuries, was served by the once-busy Malacca businesses, mosques, temples and River, which still meanders through the community centres. The non-Europeans city on its way to meet the Straits of on this side of the river didn't have the Malacca. The eastern side of the river, benefit of any protective wall to defend on a natural hillock, is where most of themselves during those dangerous and the colonial Europeans - Portuguese, Dutch and British - left their historical and their defence? cultural landscape. This area was once surrounded by a Portuguese fortress, built in 1511 but destroyed 300 years later by the British.

The western side of the river, near the Tan Kim Seng Bridge, is where all the rest of the other early traders and settlers

Malacca, the richest spice trading port in Bugis - congregated. They first set up camps and, later, established homes, warring years. What was the secret of

> The answer lies in the architecture and, a walk down Jalan Hang Jebat, will reveal how the early residents lived, looked after the well-being of their families and secured their fortunes.

Jalan Hang Jebat, named after one of the - Chinese, Malay, Indian, Javanese and five legendary Malay warriors of Malacca

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(the others being Hang Tuah, Hang Lekir, Hang Kasturi and Hang Lekiu), was formerly known as Jonker Street, a Dutch word for 'servant or subordinate', and Jalan Gelanggang ('arena' in Malay). Now, it is the most well-known and frequented tourist street in Malacca. This bustling A few doors away is No 17 Jalan Hang road caters to a host of tourist needs, including food, foot reflexology, antiques and collectables. It also has some of the best examples of the earliest Chinese traditional architecture in Malacca. This unique architectural style belongs to a hybrid culture called the Peranakan or Baba Nyonya.

Many of the early settlers from China came during the Ming Dynasty (1368-1644). After 500 years of residence in Malacca, they had assimilated with the local Malay/ Western/Indian cultures and the resulting Peranakan tradition blended their own distinctive language, dressing, customs, cuisine and music with some significant traditional Chinese religious practices and beliefs from ancient China.

One of the first beauties on the south side of the street is No 11. This was once the family home of a Peranakan merchant but, today, the current tenant uses it as a ladies' fashion outlet. The façade is now a dark brown, obscuring many of its interesting architectural features and details.


In a painting I made of No 11, I attempted to bring out some of the eastern and western influences on the façade, like the two French style louvered windows topped with fanlights, which used local Malay wood carving motifs, and the two European classical pilasters framing the frontage. These pilasters have the typical Greek capital motifs, including the

dentil finishing. Below the windows is a relief plaster decorative frieze with local floral motifs and it sits elegantly above the Chinese style roof overhang for the entrance below.

Jebat and this is a gem of a façade. In my artistic impression, I tried to capture the Baba Nyonya aesthetic essence. At one time, many rich Peranakans spent lavishly on themselves and on their family homes. They would commission a group of skilful artists or craftsmen, usually from China, to build and decorate their homes.

The most outstanding feature is the beautifully executed frieze, across the whole width of the elevation, made up of the two mythical birds (a luan and a phoenix) on either side of a floral bouquet. The piece of sculpture is made up of

many colourful glazed cutout ceramic pieces of different sizes and then cemented together to fit the design. This is a traditional Chinese decorative art form not much in vogue these days. What the Babas and Nyonyas preferred at that time were flowers like peonies, fantastic birds like phoenixes, and powerful creatures like lions or dragons. These icons have deep roots in Taoist, Buddhist and Confucian philosophies.

The residents believed the phoenix and the *luan* to be auspicious birds that bring peace. They are also symbolic of the male and female, or *yin* and *yang*. The floral aspect – probably peonies, the queen of flowers – is widely known to represent noble character. Read together, this piece of metaphoric sculpture evokes the family's longing for conjugal blessings and many offspring.

The pilasters on both sides of the building are decorated with vertical plaster relief with geometric patterns which represents traditional Chinese lucky charms popular with the Taoists. Covering the entire surface of this façade are many painted flowering plants including orchids, bamboo, peach blossoms and peonies, all implying nobility, longevity and peace.

The artists who created these images and their patrons believed that these

decorations had the metaphysical power to protect the family from any unforeseen dangers and harm. This imaginative thought process opened the Chinese mind to build a metaphoric fortress around the home. The Portuguese too wanted to protect their possessions but they believed in putting all their army and workforce into building a stone wall that was 18m high and 4.5m wide, only to be destroyed later by the British. What is left of the Portuguese fortress now is just an old gateway, the A Famosa. The Chinese heritage, however, is still to be found widely and in many streets of Malacca today.

Just next door to No 17 is No 21 Jalan Hang Jebat, built in 1911. It is many years older than No 17 but not as decorative. The balustrade, lined with European dark green baluster, sits proudly across the façade. It also announces the building's date of construction. The main focus of this frontage is the framed plaster relief of a traditional Chinese landscape, with fantastical birds and creatures, set between two wooden louvered windows. This artwork on the wall is symbolic of auspiciousness and happiness.

There is also a second plaster relief of a nature landscape sprouting from the top of the framed artwork. This additional layout was perhaps an afterthought by the

"Jalan Hang Jebat has some of the best examples of the earliest Chinese traditional architecture in Malacca." owner, who obviously wanted to double his fortune and so ordered the artist to do the necessary add-on. But it does look odd in an otherwise elegant mix of the eastern and western architectural motifs of that period.

One of the most impressive buildings on Jalan Hang Jebat is No 97, the Lui Chiew association building with its unmistakable roof. In the middle of this colourful and flamboyant roof line, there is a flag staff. Below it is the date of this building -1926. This was a time of great wealth and confidence in the region and in the city. Standing proudly in the hollowed out pediment is a beautifully shaped vase, an auspicious object that evokes in the Chinese mind the ideas of peace and prosperity. Sitting below the vase is a medallion with arabesques of interlocking foliage and flowers on both sides. To the Babas and Nyonyas, this conveys nobility and purity. The final touch is the two fantastical creatures - half lion and half tiger - standing guard on both sides of the gable, as if warding off any potential invaders or ill omens.

Jalan Hang Jebat has a long and rich cultural history. This was not just a street for the Peranakan homes but also their temples, schools, a variety of traditional services and trades, restaurants, markets, funeral parlours, hospitals, clubs, and sporting and cultural associations.

The Lui Chiew clan association building is one of the many social institutions along this street. Once, the various ethnic Chinese clans were important political and trade organisations responsible for resolving trade and territorial disputes,

and also providing security and protection for their members. Today, they still come together to celebrate local and religious holidays, and the association buildings are a place to socialise and learn Chinese traditional culture and current interests.

At one time, the Chinese artists and their patrons knew by heart all these cultural metaphors for family and community happiness, wealth and longevity. One wonders how many locals and visitors take the time to look up from the busy road and take in some of this fantastic public art or know the cultural significance behind them. Since 2008, however, when the cities of Malacca and Penang were listed as UNESCO World Heritage Sites, there has been an awakening. This has brought much more local and international interest in the cultural significance and preservation of the two historic cities. And, therein, lies the value. Not just for Malaysia, but for the world.

# The Marine Master

Gaya Island Resort's resident marine biologist Scott Mayback thrills at the beauty of Sabah's underwater treasures and the challenge of preserving them.

Hugging the shore of Malohom Bay, with a ringside view of the majestic Mount Kinabalu across the waters, Gaya Island Resort is what the doctor would have ordered for stressbusting. The perfect place to recharge your batteries, it's the ideal tropical hideaway, with a stretch of sandy beach gently lapped by the South China Sea, while a hill, canopied by virgin rainforests and teeming with nature's bounty of exotic flora and fauna, forms the backdrop. YTL Hotels' latest resort in the Tunku Abdul Rahman Marine Park in Sabah showcases the company mantra of responsible tourism by minimising the environmental impact of its construction and reducing carbon footprints in its operation. It offers guests the best of Borneo by creating PURE activities of Discovery, Vigour, Creativity and Balance. These holistic activities are designed to encapsulate the "vibrancy, scents, textures, sounds and tastes of the natural environment and cultural heritage of the region".

One of the most popular PURE activities, understandably in a marine park, is aquatic sports under the Discovery programme helmed by Scott Mayback, the resident marine biologist. Originally from Long Island, New York, Mayback came to Sabah nearly five years ago to work on a project called the Green Connection, an aquarium and marine science discovery centre in Sabah, before joining Gaya Island Resort. While some are interested in outer space, 'inner space' is Mayback's thing. Marine exploration and

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

conservation are his passion, and, as a child, Mayback was always intrigued by the underwater world and fascinated by the interactions and interconnections between marine organisms. He pursued his interest at the University of Oregon and spent a year at the Oregon Institute of Marine Biology learning about coral propagation. It was love at first dive when he took up scuba diving and he has been smitten ever since by the secrets of the deep. After graduation, he travelled around Central America before ending up in Sabah while looking for a diver's paradise.

A typical day in the office for Mayback is spent teaching guests how to enjoy snorkelling on the reef without causing unnecessary damage. That aside, his main focus is working on the Gaya Island Resort Marine Centre. Mayback explains: "The exhibition centre will include four species of coral nursery tanks, one for the breeding of seahorses and pipe fish, and one turtle rescue centre, which will provide a safe and stable environment for sick or injured sea turtles to give them the best chance for survival. The coral nursery is to establish an artificial environment to aquaculture coral fragments that will be returned to the sea to help rejuvenate and enhance our natural reefs. The Marine Centre is an education and outreach plan, to educate our guests on the importance of coral conservation and to engage the local community in protecting our ocean environment. Our services will include guided tours, weekly conservation talks, adopt a coral/turtle schemes and the Be A Marine Biologist for a Day programme." The centre

is located at Tavajun Bay, a beautiful, secluded bay next to the main resort, where guests can spend the whole day relaxing on comfortable sun loungers, while learning about the magical world of the deep and its fragility.

While there is a plenty of publicity and banner-waving about saving the rainforest in Sabah, Mayback has greater interest in saving the waters around it. Asked how he would contribute to this cause, he says: "The bigger picture of conservation in Sabah requires governmental intervention to minimise habitat loss and further degradation, as well as education to inculcate a love for the environment from an early age. I will help by teaching those around me to conserve our natural resources before it is too late."

> Since coming to Sabah, Mayback has immersed himself in the local culture and even picked up Bahasa Malaysia. In his downtime, he relaxes by exercising, playing sports and indulging in his passion for travel. He has travelled all around Sabah and, as expected, his favourite spots are Sipadan, listed by the BBC as one of the top 10 dive sites in the world, and the lesser-known Banggi Island, just off Kudat on the northern coast, where the marine life is just as abundant and conditions are perfect for diving. Asked





what he misses most about America, he says: "My friends and family, of course, and I really miss the food."

For now, though, Mayback has something to accomplish and is here to stay as he works on marine conservation, and responsible and sustainable fishing. "End blast and cyanide fishing so that coral reefs will have a chance to re-grow and return to its natural beauty once again", he says. "Sabah's coral reef is in good shape but still need research and protection to keep them for future generations." His personal mission is, as he puts it, "to help create a sense of environmental stewardship and inspire those around me to take action." The marine master







YTL Life brings you some of BaselWorld 2013's highlights from a stellar line-up of brands found in Kuala Lumpur's Starhill Gallery.

ULYSSE NARDIN - Crafted in collaboration with musician Dieter Meier, Stranger by Ulysse Nardin demonstrates the brand's affinity with musical timepieces. This wristwatch emulates a classic music Night on the hour or at your whim.



RADO - Once again, the brand demonstrates its mastery over ceramic with the unveiled DiaMaster RHW1. This timepiece presents a 44.0 x 52.8mm case forged of a rugged 'old bronze' coloured high-tech ceramic composite (Si3N4 TiN), offering superior durability at half the weight of regular ceramic. At the heart of this featherweight yet hard-as-nails timepiece beats the aluminium manual-winding RHW1 mechanical movement.

**HERMÈS** – This über-luxe French maison manifests its commitment to immaculate attention with the *Dressage Chronograph*, the newest addition to the revered Dressage collection first conceived a decade ago. Available in two versions, an opaline-silvered dial as well as a black dial, the timepiece houses the Manufacture H1925 self-winding mechanical movement within a 40.5 x 38.4mm tonneau-shaped stainless steel case. As expected of a brand such as Hermès, the finishing of the dial presenting the hours, minutes, seconds at 3 o'clock, date and chronograph is second to none.

DAVIDOFF - For lovers of luxury, it is essential to equip yourself suitably in a cosmopolitan world. Harness time with impeccable fashion using Davidoff's Velocity Gent Automatic Moonphase timepiece. It presents a moonphase at six o'clock, the day at 11 o'clock and month at one o'clock, alongside its hours, minutes and seconds indicator within a 40mm stainless steel case.





BEDAT & CO - Drawing inspiration from the iconic N°3 collection, Bedat & Co presented this year's stunning limited edition Extravaganza Collection 2013 - Ref 325. This feminine piece features two intertwining bezels and a mother-of-pearl dial displaying delicate Roman numerals and indexes, and finished with more than six carats of diamonds.

TUDOR - Inspired by the Ducati motorcycle, the Tudor Fastrider Black Shield presents a 42mm-case forged of menacing black monobloc ceramic. At the fiery heart of this timepiece is Tudor's self-winding calibre 7753 movement, which powers the hours. minutes, small seconds at 3 o' clock and chronograph function.

CECIL PURNELL - BaselWorld 2013 saw the introduction of Cecil Purnell's inaugural ladies' piece, the seductively beautiful Lady Lacroix. This mystical timepiece features an 18K gold-engraved floral frame against a translucent green enamel dial, to enhance the subtle beauty of the CP-V11 tourbillon movement.

RJ-ROMAIN JEROME – Let your imagination soar with the formidable Moon Orbiter as your intergalactic companion. This outworldly timepiece has been designed to ensure no detail of the RJ3000-A mechanical self-winding movement goes unnoticed. To top off the space-faring theme, the Moon Orbiter incorporates steel from the Apollo 11 shuttle into its structure, with extraterrestrial moon-dust layered into the dial where the flying tourbillon is housed.

**ANTOINE MARTIN** – With most modern watches running at 4Hz, Antoine Martin has decided to throw conformity to the wind with



very first dual time-zone watch with a day/night indicator. This timepiece makes use of an externally sourced Sopord 9351/A10-2 self-winding mechanical movement and builds on Hautlence's DNA of architectural design, pure lines and a sense of three-dimensionality.

FRANC VILA – Brace yourself for the tongue-twisting FVi N° 8 Tourbillon Intrepido SuperLigero Skeleton. Like its predecessors in the Intrepido collection, this timepiece makes use of Lightnium, an aluminium-lithium alloy used in aeronautical engineering for its lightness and high-tensile strength. This allowed for the creation of the lightweight yet extremely durable hand-wound tourbillon FV N° 8 movement, visible through the skeletonised dial.

ARMAND NICOLET – Ever renowned for its mastery in producing beautiful timepieces with classical movements, Armand Nicolet did not disappoint at Baselworld 2013 with the *LS8* timepiece. The *LS8* features a skeletonised open-faced guilloche dial through which the wearer can behold the majesty

its *Slow Runner*. This timepiece takes the mantle as the world's slowest wristwatch, ticking away at a glacial 1Hz. However, thanks to the kinetic energy stored up in the colossal 24mm balance wheel (four times the size of a standard balance wheel), the *Slow Runner* does not compromise on any accuracy and is also more resistant to sudden movements and shocks. This timepiece is powered by the in-house AM36.001 hand-wound movement within a 42mm case of stainless steel or rose gold.

**REBELLION** – Fear not the night with the futuristically dark and gritty *T-1000 Gotham* strapped to your wrist. With six mainspring barrels resembling ammunition racks arming this timepiece, the *T-1000 Gotham* packs over 1,000 hours of power reserve. Encased in an armoured shell of black titanium, this juggernaut

of a timepiece resides on your wrist with surprising comfort and lightness. At the heart of this monster growls the manual-winding REB T-1000 movement with a state-of-the-art winding lever.

HAUTLENCE - The aptly named *Destination* by Hautlence marks a milestone in this young independent's history as its







**HUBLOT** – The earth shook in Basel this year when Hublot unveiled its definitive ode to power reserve. On the dial of the *MP-05 LaFerrari* were 11 barrels arranged as a spine, concealing a total wire length of 77 metres. This innovation translates into an insane 50-day power reserve, with 637 components providing the physical method to the madness. Only 50 pieces will ever be produced, in black PVD titanium.

OMEGA – An all-black timepiece on the wrist is sure to generate attention and curiosity. This year's Omega's *Moonwatch*, nicknamed 'Dark Side of the Moon', is an attention-grabber with 18K white-gold indexes and blackened sub-dials that update it from its predecessor. On both front and back is scratch-resistant sapphire crystal with anti-reflective treatment, while its Co-Axial calibre 9300 within means the timepiece comes with the comforting feeling of a full four-year warranty.

LOUIS VUITTON – Rewriting the rules of a chronograph, Louis Vuitton's La Fabrique du Temps decided to go ahead and make history with its *Tambour Twin Chrono*. This chronograph features a first-in-the-world differential display, with two measured times on separate subdials. Encasing the LV175 movement is an 18K white gold case that matches its 18K white gold hands.

TAG HEUER - At BaselWorld, an impressive crowd built up daily at the entrance of the main hall. The reason for this gathering of onlookers was an actual Porsche *Carrera* which inspired Jack Heuer, fourth generation of the Tag Heuer family to design the timepiece homage to this iconic automobile. That this happened

half a century ago was cause for a celebration, and the 2013 animation of the Carrera Calibre 16 Day Date went down a treat; its three chronograph subdials, tachymetre scale and red hands recalling white-knuckled thrills on the road.

Seconde Mystèrieuse. An ML215 calibre is the magnificent conductor that moves the floating seconds hand in a zany way across a subdial. Again,

its existence, sometimes it is the tiniest thing that makes the most sense. Case in point: the silicon blade in Girard-Perregaux's Constant Escapement 13

is a triumph in miniaturisation, concealing two antennas that will broadcast both digital and analog signals via a microtransmitter over a 24-hour period. BELL & ROSS - It's not so much step, as it is hurtle, into the past with Bell & Ross' nod to 60s-era civil aviation, Its Vintage Falcon BR126 is a reminder of the 10-seater Falcon private jet built by Dassault Aviation. Sand-coloured hands and numerals, a round case and bulging sapphire crystal are but some of the recall triggers in this 1960s time capsule.

CHOPARD - Something for the ladies comes in the form of Chopard's Imperiale Joaillerie Améthyste. One might ask, is it a timepiece or jewellery? The answer lies somewhere in between,

looking at the sparkling 40mm 18K white gold case set with brilliant-cut diamonds and cabochon- and baquette-cut amethysts, while a mechanical self-winding movement proves the other half of the equation, powering rhodium hands across a mother-of-pearl and diamond-set dial.

ROLEX - A giddy combination of pearl and diamonds can be found in the Oyster Perpetual Lady-Datejust Pearlmaster. An earlier model was worn on a balmy evening in 2006 by the mezzosoprano Cecilia Bartoli, who sang Exsultate, Jubilate at a gala concert celebrating the 250th anniversary of Mozart's birth. ## When East Meets East

A master dyer from Kyoto, Japan, teams up with a contemporary Malaysian batik maison to stunning effect.

At 70 years of age and dressed in a supremely elegant kimono, Akira Yamamoto looks every inch the master craftsman that he is. Having journeyed recently from Kyoto to Kuala Lumpur, the renowned Japanese dye master boasts an illustrious career, beginning as a kyo-yuzen dyer in the 33rd year of the reign of Showa. For those unfamiliar with the name, vuzen is the Japanese art of dyeing, not too dissimilar from batik. The main difference is in its usage of stencils and rice paste, as opposed to wax. It was said that this method of dyeing was introduced to Japan in the eighth century and legend credits the artist Miyazaki Yuzensai of Kyoto for being the first to create hand-painted *yuzen*. After spending 11 years mastering *yuzen*, Master Yamamoto then decided leave Japan to travel the world, visiting countries as diverse as India, Egypt and Greece, in order to study the origin of the dye technique, which is said to date back at least five thousand years. Upon his return, at the age of 30, he became a student of Ujyo Maeda, one of the most famous Japanese masters of natural dye, who had once been tasked by the late Emperor Hirohito to revive and preserve this traditional art form and technique. "Natural dye is more subtle... very fine and delicate. It is also very difficult to create as there are many challenges in its production process and techniques. For example, we use only what can be collected, like scraps of wood bark or leaves that has fallen to the ground," he shares, bringing new meaning to the word 'natural'. Traditionally working with ingredients like plum moss and kihada, a type of tree bark which is then boiled in order to extract a delicate hue, Master Yamamoto

was pleased to share that he had spent some time exploring Penang Hill, in Malaysia's north, where he had chanced upon some new natural ingredients that he will take back to Japan for experimentation.

All this is being done in collaboration with Pink Jambu, a renowned name in contemporary Malaysian batik. Tengku Marina Ibrahim, the brand's CEO and Design Director, points out that "batik has, for far too long, been regarded as a souvenir handicraft from Malaysia. Just as kimonos are a work of art, we want to show too that there is very high-quality batik. We are also planning to launch a line of kimono fabrics and it is hoped that, by marrying fine quality batik fabric with the art of Japanese natural dyeing, a whole new audience might open up in appreciation. We believe this is the way forward." Tengku Marina adds: "Also, Pink Jambu has always been dedicated to creating the very best in textiles."

"It is my first visit to Malaysia," adds Master Yamamoto. "Did you know the technique of natural dye originates from this part of the world? And I can tell you I am very glad, because working with Pink Jambu and Malaysian batik, I feel my technique has, at last, come full-circle. It has come home."



Just as winter is all about introspection, dark days and ice, summer is all about light, heat and brightness. Taking this into consideration, the team at Spa Village Hangzhou has created a summer spa journey designed to cool and refresh, while

calming one's inner fire as vang energies are said to be at their most intense during this time. Begin by being enveloped in a cooling mask of barley and cucumber to draw heat away from the body, while your therapist proceeds to wrap you in warm blankets to draw out impurities from the skin, soothe inflammation and calm any irritation. As you luxuriate in your cocoon, she will proceed to treat you to a deeplyrelaxing head massage. You'll soon find yourself dipping in and out of a dreamy state of consciousness. After about 20 minutes, you are invited to have a hot shower before proceeding to immerse yourself in a Silver Moon Bath - a lotus and peony soak that is designed to battle hypertension and regulate any lingering sleep issues. Lotus, a popular symbol in Hangzhou, is long-regarded as a symbol of vitality and purity. Its seeds are said to possess astringent qualities and work wonders at calming irritability - a hot weather probability. Scattered rose and carnation petals add to the languorous experience.

The highlight of the Summer Joy experience follows - the Lemon-Aid massage, so named due to the lemon essential oils used

in this bodywork treatment, which will bring mind, body and spirit to a place of balance and calm. My therapist was particularly skilful with her hands, blessing me with firm acupressure, powerful fingerwork and deep, flowing tension-releasing strokes, all performed Swedish-style, complete with kneading and the rhythmic tapping known as tapotement. And although three hours might seem fairly long for a treatment, I chose to augment my experience with a further 90-minute facial session. Opting for the Amala Platinum Facial, which uses Ute Leube's renowned range of luxurious organic skincare products from Germany, I was pampered with a very-thorough facial ritual which used several key bio-botanical active products, including Amala's soothing rose water, a sea algae peel-off mask and a second collagen mask that is rich in natural firming agents and Vitamin A. This treatment is designed to nourish and rejuvenate while working on tightening and firming up the skin – a necessity if your job involves late nights and long hours.

## Wok The World

The Lot 10 Hutong in Kuala Lumpur has long been the go-to destination for those wanting to sample the best of Malaysia's justifiably-famous street cuisine all under one roof. Now, the Lot 10 Hutong concept goes international with the opening of its first hugely-awaited outlet in Guangzhou, China.

Malaysian street food takes on the world, one city at a time, beginning with Guangzhou, China.

It's inconceivable to come to Kuala Lumpur and not sample its dizzying array of street food. From the charcoal-fired black beauty of a dish of Hokkien noodles to the herbal goodness of a bowl of *bak kut teh* (pork rib soup), there is something deeply-comforting about tucking into a dish that is hearty and robust while embodying the flavourful soul of a nation. Granted, Malaysian street food is already renowned the world over, but true foodies and connoisseurs alike know that there is street food and there is *street* food.

Malaysia's hawker food culture has undeniably been greatly enhanced by the Chinese Diaspora. Having settled in the country since the days of the Malaccan sultanate, the Chinese have adapted their cuisine to local tastes and, in fact, boast a unique culinary heritage and richness that is all their own. In Kuala Lumpur, for example, there are stalls and establishments that have been pleasing palates for several generations now and have since become household names themselves. Soong Kee, for example, is considered the nec plus ultra when it comes to beef noodles, while Ho Weng Kee's wonton mee has kept several generations of Malaysians happily satisfied since it was first established along Petaling Street by Ho Weng, an immigrant from Guangdong, in 1930. ## Sun, Sea & Sauté

With Executive Chef Hemant Dadlani at the helm of your dining experience, expect an added gastronomic frisson that will make your stay at Pangkor Laut Resort just that much more enthralling.

A dream holiday is like a grand banquet - great location, excellent service and an epicurean maestro to create food that tastes and looks sensational. Food is of primal importance in a holiday as it feeds your soul through your body and, when set in a paradise island, the elixir of life is complete. That's my idea of a perfect holiday - sun, sea and a satisfied stomach - and I discovered it in Pangkor Laut Resort. Just 300 acres in size, largely covered by a pristine rainforest and fringed by a craggy coastline punctuated by sandy coves, the sole resort on the island is a gourmet's delight. While the accommodations are luxurious and the natural beauty of the island is stunningly enchanting, the cuisine is the icing on the cake.

There are seven food outlets here - two fine dining restaurants, Fisherman's Cove and The Straits, two informal diners, Uncle Lim's Kitchen and Feast Village, and three casual lunch outlets, Royal Bay Beach Club, a poolside bistro, Chapman's Bar on Emerald Bay and Jamu Bar at Spa Village. Commanding this diverse and complex catering operation is Hemant Dadlani, the resort's young and talented executive chef. Fresh from his last post as executive chef of the Rosewood Little Dix Bay resort in the British Virgin Islands, Dadlani, who hails from India, is no stranger to running an upscale culinary operation, having spent years working for various luxury brands in the hospitality industry in the Caribbean.

With Malaysia's cornucopia of fresh products, it is like a blank canvas for a kitchen wizard like Dadlani, who confessed that he has "an allergy towards bland food". Right up his street, he explains: "I am having the experience of a lifetime being in Malaysia. The local food culture is spectacular and immensely

diverse. This is unlike any country where I have ever lived. Being partial towards Malay or Indian cuisines is natural because that is my comfort zone. Many ingredients and processes involved are still alien to me, but I am trying to close this gap. I am learning Chinese cuisine and, once I get there, I am hoping to be able to balance my interests."

Describing his food as "contemporary tropical cuisine", Dadlani explains: "Having lived for most of my life in the tropics, I combine bold local flavours (depending on where I am) with modern cooking methods. My favourite ingredients are seafood. My Indian background provides me with an interesting palate. Having grown up in India, one develops a strong sense of taste for bold flavours. This has helped me over the years in deciding on combination of flavours." He has an extensive repertoire of exciting dishes for the menu but his favourite signature dishes, such as olive oil poached halibut in mild coconut curry, tandoori silver pomfret with squid ink risotto and miso tuna with agave honey and avocado, reflect his distinct trademark in using local produce and embracing the cooking style of other cultures. He has fun experimenting with various local staples. "I have been heavily influenced by Creole cuisine for many years. I like combining tropical fruits and seafood. Some interesting things we did here are lobster laksa with rambutan dumpling, grilled squid with watermelon and bird's eye chilli salsa, and pandan leaf sorbet with frozen strawberry powder," he enthused.

Being in a "one island, one resort" can be quite challenging for a chef as some fresh products and other essentials can only be delivered once a week. To alleviate this problem, the resort is planning a "farm to plate" concept with small-

Fortunately, Pangkor Laut's sister island, Pangkor Island, supplies most of its seafood requirements and the resort's farm will complement the larder. Dadlani enjoys the intimacy of an island resort where he can really work closely with his executive sous chefs to plan the menu and to bond as a team.

As a foodie and a mediocre cook, I was keen to sharpen my skills with Dadlani under the Chef's Kitchen Experience. The programme started with a tour of the kitchen of the Feast Village to observe behind-the-scene activities of a working professional kitchen. After breakfast, it's off to Pangkor Island by boat and visit the local market to see first-hand where the resort gets its fresh

watching fresh noodles being made at the island's famous noodle shop. Back at the resort, it's spa time to rejuvenate those tired muscles after the morning's outing and get ready for a cookery class in the early afternoon with Dadlani in the show kitchen. Under his expert tutelage, I assisted in the preparation of an impressive menu of rasam soup, chicken tandoori, Rajasthan dal and prawn masala, which I will add to my bragging rights when I next host a dinner party. I even have a certificate to show for it. On my final night, Dadlani prepared a mini banquet for me and my companions at The Straits with a sampler menu of his signature dishes, each of which was an art on a plate. With such a sumptuous feast delivered with artistic flair against the setting of a silvery moon over the sea, it would be hard-pressed

Method:



#### Poached Halibut in Mild Coconut Curry with Watermelon & Chilli Salsa

#### Ingredients

250g halibut fillet 150 ml olive oil 2 sprigs fresh thyme

#### For curry sauce:

1tbsp olive oil 2 cups fish stock 1tbsp ginger (finely chopped) 1/2 cup onion (finely chopped) 1tbsp lemongrass (finely chopped) 1 tsp lemon zest 1tsp turmeric powder ½ cup coconut milk Green chilli to taste

#### Salsa:

1 cup watermelon (diced) 1tsp orange zest 1tsp lemon zest 1/2tsp ginger (finely chopped) 1tsp fresh lemon juice 1tbsp fresh orange juice Bird's eye chilli & sea salt to taste

1. Slice halibut fillet in half and remove skin (if any). Heat olive oil in a 3in deep sauté pan to 120°F or about 50°C. Maintain oil temperature and drop in fresh thyme. Place fish in the heated oil

and gently cook for about 15 minutes. Maintaining the temperature between 115°F and 122°F (47°C and 50°C).

2. While the fish is cooking, prepare the curry sauce. Heat olive oil in a sauce pan. Add ginger, onion and lemongrass. Cook at low heat and add turmeric powder. Once the onion is translucent, add chilli and fish stock. Bring to a boil and cook for 10 minutes. Add coconut milk and whisk the sauce for five minutes. Season with salt and lemon zest, and strain.

3. For all the salsa ingredients and season to taste.

4. Serve fish in a bowl with curry sauce and top it with watermelon salsa.

#### Chicken Rendang Ingredients

500g chicken leg 50g dried chilli 50g garlic, minced 50g shallot, minced 5 pieces lemongrass 1 stick cinnamon 4 pieces cardamom 2 pieces star anise 1 cup coconut milk 4tbsp vegetable oil 1tsp turmeric powder 1tsp fennel powder 1tsp cumin powder 2tsp coriander powder 1 cup dessicated coconut 30g palm sugar 1 piece turmeric leaf

3 piece lime leaf

Pinch of minced ginger and minced Salt and sugar to taste

#### Method:

1. Heat vegetable oil and fry cinnamon stick, star anise, cardamom and lemongrass till fragrant. Add minced garlic, shallot, ginger and galangal, and stir until golden brown.

2. Add chilli paste and cook for another two minutes while stirring continuously. Add turmeric powder, cumin powder, coriander powder and fennel powder, and cook for another two minutes.

3. Add desiccated coconut and cook for another two minutes. Add chicken and coconut milk. Cook over a medium heat until chicken is browned.

4. Add lime leaf, palm sugar and season to taste. Stir until most of the liquid has evaporated and chicken is tender.

5. Garnish with sliced turmeric leaves and serve hot with steamed rice.


Starhill Culinary Studio attracts an interesting profile of people. Some prefer private lessons while others want to learn in a social setting. Then, there are corporate clients who invite either their










#### SIGHTS & SOUNDS
