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

My sources of inspiration are art, dance, theatre, film and, surprisingly, exercise. But for 2015, I'd like to explore Japan. It has always felt quite mysterious and exotic to me, a land of sushi and cherry blossoms.

My dream holiday depends on my state of mind. If I am exhausted, I need someplace warm where I can read and sleep a lot. I have been on two spa-type holidays with healthy food and no alcohol, after which I felt like I have pressed a re-set button, feeling rejuvenated in mind, body and soul. Alternatively, I love a good ski holiday. I've been going to the French Alps since I was a child and nothing beats a long day skiing, a log fire, a glass of red wine and family shenanigans.

My recent Pangkor Laut experience was pure paradise. Jade green waters, cheeky monkeys and relaxing massages every day! I loved the wonderful service and the sheer peacefulness of it all. It's just what the doctor ordered.


Village Life

Having plumped for an early morning flight from KLIA, we touched down at Sultan Mahmud Airport in Kuala Terengganu at around 9am and were relieved to find our driver from Tanjong Jara Resort already waiting for us at the arrival hall. Still groggy from having to drag ourselves out of bed so early that morning, my photographer and I hopped into our ride and promptly fell asleep.

The journey from the airport to Tanjong Jara Resort, located about 78km to the south, takes slightly more than an hour, enough time for 40 winks, which can be a pity because the scenery along the way sets the tone for the vacation ahead. Shortly after leaving the city parameters, we were greeted by an endless stretch of fishing villages and bucolic towns, with occasional glimpses of the sea, just the reprieve needed from the soul-sapping urban madness in glass-and-concrete structures. Upon arrival at the beautiful lobby, fringed on one side by lily ponds, we were welcomed by a cheerful *pakcik* dressed in a smart *baju Melayu*. He proceeded to engage us in jovial chitchat about our trip and plans during our stay. As the resort staff checked us in, we were offered a cold glass of Roselle juice made from the extracts of hibiscus flowers that grow abundantly here. Rich in Vitamin C and antioxidants, it was a welcome drink with a healthy twist.

The resort's tagline, 'Unmistakably Malay', is complemented by the philosophy of Sucimumi, which means 'purity' and 'harmony' in Malay. Surrounded by a forest, a fishing village and the South China Sea, it is designed to be the ideal spot to relax and rejuvenate in a typical Malaysian countryside setting. The exterior of the 99 rooms sprawled across the 17-hectare resort is modelled after the grandeur and elegance of a 17th century Malay palace, complete with slanting roofs, spacious verandahs and stone steps. The interior is suitably rustic and timbered out from floor to ceiling.

Our Serambi Sea View Room, for instance, sits on the edge of a palm tree-dotted garden with a lone swing, which appears to be a favourite spot for selfies with the honeymooners. I paused on the verandah to take in the sight of the sea in the near distance and enjoy the inviting sounds of the waves. For a city dweller, such idyllic moments are hard to come by and are meant to be savoured whenever possible. And so I did.

Silence, Please

No visit to a YTL Luxury Resort is complete without a stop at its award-winning spa, even if it is only for a foot rub, which is why the first thing on our agenda was to call in at the Spa Village Tanjong Jara. The Spa Village makes it a point to adopt indigenous healing methods in its treatments. At Tanjong Jara, ancient Malay therapies, handed down through generations, form the core of therapeutic remedies. The á la carte menu reads like a list of old home remedies ranging from the invigorating *Traditional Malay Massage* and *Traditional Malay Dry Massage* to the pre-wedding ritual of *Scented Body Steaming* and the migraine-busting *Malay Scalp Treatment*. If you are at a loss, opt for the *Traditional Malay Experience* that combines a host of treatments for truly indulgent pampering. Featuring separate combos for men and women, the former comprises, among others, the *Warrior Massage* that employs deep tissue strokes, the *Herbal Roots Scrub* and the *Herbal Oil Steam Bath*. For the women, the deep tissue massage is known by the more feminine *Urutan Gamelan* and is combined with a *Hair Cream Bath* and a *Fragrant Milk Bath* scented with jasmine, rose and magnolia. Each session kicks off with the *Malay Floral Bath* and ends with

a serving of a herbal roots tonic drink brewed in an earthen pot, a traditional cooking method in Malay villages. The gift of a batik *sarong* at the end of each session was a nice touch.

Yum List


Lunch beckons at the beachfront Nelayan (Malay for 'fisherman') right next to the gorgeous infinity pool. The restaurant serves sun-worshippers light snacks and drinks throughout the day but, after the sun sets, it transforms into an elegant venue, complete with bamboo torches and gentle sea breeze, truly an inviting setting to savour delicious seafood. Pampered and fed, all we could muster next was to slap on the sunblock and reclined on deckchairs by the pool. Evening came and we headed to the Di Atas Sungei restaurant for dinner. The name means 'above the river'; the restaurant, in fact, is built on stilts over a tiny river that flows right out to sea. Dinner was interesting since the restaurant operates without a menu and is dependent on what fresh produce the chefs are able to find at the market each day. In lieu of a proper menu, we had to rely on recommendations from the Menu Masters. Di Atas Sungei is also the resort's breakfast venue and the spread is magnificent, with everything from local favourites such as the must-try nasi dagang to croissants that are baked in an oven in the dining room itself! With the smell of fresh coffee and bread lingering in the air, it's just the pick-me-up needed to start the day on the right footing.

Tuning In

There is every reason to just relax in the resort throughout the vacation. In fact, I was tempted to sit by the pool all day with an unread pile of *People* magazines that I had brought along with me. But being the adventurous, outdoorsy type, I couldn't help but be drawn to the host of activities the resort has to offer. There is diving and snorkelling at nearby **Tenggol Island**, arguably the most popular attraction in this neck of the woods (see feature on page 22). Explore the local culture and environs by taking part in the half-day Marang River Cruise that lets you discover the wonders of the mangrove wildlife, before ending up with a visit to a Malay village where you get to see local handicrafts being made and sample home-cooked food.

I personally enjoyed the guided bicycle tour that begins on the coastal road of **Pantai Teluk Bidara**, which is the beach along the resort, and ends at Kampung Seberang Pintasan, a fishing village where we could watch the locals building fishing boats using the old method that does not need a single nail. Along the way, we found a most charming path strewn on each side with a layer of cotton from the *kekubu* trees. If you are a budding chef, you could learn about local cooking from Chef Ann, a jolly, bespectacled woman who will introduce the secrets of blending herbs and spices. The cooking class always kicks off with a trip to the wet market in nearby Dungun, an old iron-mining town, where Chef Ann will pick out the fresh produce not just for the day's lesson but also for dinner at Di Atas Sungei. If you are not feeling up to venturing out, the resort brings the lively side of *kampong* (village) life onto its grounds every Saturday afternoon, where guests can partake in local food such as *lemang* (glutinous rice cooked in bamboo) and *lekor* (deep-fried fish sausages), and play traditional games like *congkak* and *sepak takraw*.

You could also ask a Malay gentleman to get his trained monkey to pluck coconuts from the trees – even if the temperamental animal doesn't always do as it's told,



providing much amusement with its antics. If you are adventurous enough, sign up for a trek to **Chemerung Waterfall**, a 90-minute drive away. It is then an easy 30 to 45-minute climb through a rainforest. The reward that awaits at the top is a spectacular view, a refreshing dip in a water pool and a hearty lunch prepared by the resort. If the long drive puts you off, take the **Jara Hill Walk** through a lush jungle connected to the resort. At the end of it, be awed by a panoramic view of the coastline. And, if you are lucky, you might spot an eagle's nest.

Should muscles ache after partaking in the various activities, the Spa Village is just the cure. I was in such a state and opted for the *Traditional Malay Massage* this time. The long kneading strokes, using both the palms and elbows, coupled with the energising treatment oil of turmeric, cinnamon, garlic, onion and citronella, served to relax and revitalise the body. The resort has been a wonderful experience; I was already dreading the fact that I had to check out the next day after a three-day, two-night stay. There is something magical about the East Coast, with its unhurried pace and the warmth of its people, and Tanjong Jara Resort captures its rhythm beautifully.



Just Dive In

Tenggol Island, on the doorsteps of Tanjong Jara Resort, is a diver's dream.



Practically right at Tanjong Jara Resort's doorsteps is Tenggol Island, home to some of Malaysia's most spectacular dive sites. Tenggol promises to mesmerise even the most seasoned divers with its abundant marine life. The diving season begins from March to October each year. I was at the award-winning Tanjong Jara Resort, the gateway to Tenggol Island, in March last year. Tanjong Jara Resort, just an hour's flight away or a leisurely four-hour drive from Kuala Lumpur, is tucked away near a beachfront and exudes all the charm of a luxurious Malay-style resort. It will take a lot of effort to peel yourself away from all the resort's creature comforts to go diving.

Protected as part of a marine park since 1994, Tenggol is rich in marine life, boasting over 20 dive sites. Tenggol fringes the famed Coral Triangle, considered the epicentre of marine biodiversity. We set out with the resort's dive team the next morning after a hearty breakfast at Di Atas Sungei restaurant. A van took us on a 10-minute ride to the Dungun River mouth jetty. From there, Pulau Tenggol is 50 minutes away by speed boat. The first stop was **The Edge**, a good 30m descent to the bottom of the sea. Down there, it's a surreal world of pastel corals and curious sea creatures.

The highlight of this dive was a sighting of a huge Humphead Parrot Fish just going about its everyday business of looking for food. I was actually more excited by a friendly Hawksbill turtle grazing on the corals quite oblivious to us. We saw schools of Fusiliers and Jacks, with an occasional stingray and an inquisitive Clown fish peeking up from the anemone as we passed by. They seemed to be lounging in the soft corals, turning this way and that for a massage on their stomachs or little heads. The territorial fish won't hesitate to lunge at you to protect their homes. We surfaced in a sheltered bay of Tenggol, where the cook had prepared lunch for us. The island is rocky and heavily forested and if you still haven't savoured enough of the crystal clear waters, you can wade out from the beach for a snorkel and be amazed at the staghom corals – home to countless Damsels and Cardinals – in the centre of the bay.

We made our way back to our final dive spot, **Tokong Timor** (East Temple), a rock outcrop populated topside by seagulls. We back rolled from the seaward side of the rock, where the current was coming from, and, after descending, left the rest to the flow of the current. We witnessed even more beauty as coral walls formed a dazzling mass of olive greens, mauves and blues, while giant boulders loomed amidst more sea life. Tokong Timor was exhilarating. The next day's diving took us to **Nyireh Point** and **Coral Garden**. Along the way, three playful dolphins greeted us, occasionally surfacing to blow breathe and say hello to us. These friendly mammals of the seas stayed with us for most of the boat ride before disappearing into the deep blue. Nyireh Point should be explored at a leisurely pace as you soak in the prolific corals and their inhabitants.



Divers will be treated to amazing marine riches at popular spots like The Edge, Amazing Grace and Nyireh Point. Observe the diligent Parrotfish chomping away at the corals for food, or the curious Map Pufferfish and the very shy Blue Spotted Ray darting in and out of crevasses. Coral Garden definitely lives up to its name with its sloping topography adomed with gorgeous soft and hard corals. Christmas Tree Tube Worms were aplenty as were sponges and anemones, all teeming with coral fishes. On the final day of diving, we visited Amazing Grace. This site is blessed with an endless variety of nudibranch – miniature sea snails without shells, living on corals. They range from the size of your fingernail to the size of your thumb. Nudis come in vivid, vibrant colours in the most gorgeous of combinations – greens with orange, dark blues with pinks and rich purples.

They are carnivores and will assume the colours of their diet, algae, sponges, anemones, corals, barnacles and even other nudibranchs. Their colours help in camouflage, and some even retain the foul-tasting poisons of their prey and secrete them as a defence against predators. Amazing Grace was, simply put, amazing. Marine animals here are not particularly fearful of divers and, so, don't hide when they see a group coming their way. There are fewer divers here so marine creatures aren't afraid of strange two-legged bubble-blowing creatures. Marine life thrives here. Water temperature averages 29°C, so diving in Tenggol is as comfortable as it gets. With visibility of 15 to 20m, it's a breeze to observe marine creatures like Hawksbill turtles, Blue Spotted Rays, groupers, Map Pufferfish and snappers. Gentle whale sharks and graceful manta rays can also be seen in these waters in March, April, September and October as the area forms part of their migration route. In fact, it was reported that, in 2009, several whale sharks spent almost two months in the shallower waters, much to the delight of camera-toting divers. After three days of diving, I felt completely satiated. Tenggol had engaged all my senses with its wondrous sites. Rounding off the dives, Tanjong Jara Resort pampered me with superb cuisine and well-rested nights in luxurious ambience. I couldn't have asked for more.

A Muse for the Masses

Carly Paoli is the embodiment of how dreams do come true. During a recent stopover in Malaysia to perform at A Journey Through Time VIII - Asia's premier luxury watch and jewellery showcase - the talented mezzosoprano met up with YTL Life to talk about her role as the newest ambassador of legendary Swiss timepiece brand, Bédat & Co, as well as what makes her tick.

At an age when most adults are still busy carving out their paths in life, Carly Paoli has certainly accomplished a lot within a short span of time. Born in Nottingham and raised in an English-Italian household, this 26-year-old was determined from an early age to pursue a career in classical music.

After attending The Rodney School in Nottingham and the respected Arts Education School in Hertfordshire on a full scholarship, Paoli completed her musical training with an honours degree in Vocal Studies at the prestigious Royal Northern College of Music. Shortly after graduating, she applied for a job as a school teacher. While she described the vocation as a lovely experience, she always knew that her true passion was to sing on stage.

It certainly didn't take long before Paoli's powerful vocals captured the attention of the classical music industry. For her international début, Paoli performed at the prestigious David Foster Foundation Miracle Gala, a glittering charity event, which also featured notable acts such as Aerosmith front-man Steve Tyler and Oscar-winning actress Jennifer Hudson. This was later followed by performances for audiences across Europe at world-renowned venues that included The Royal Albert Hall, St Paul's Cathedral, on board the Orient Express and Lecce's Politeama Greco Theatre.

Not one to rest on her laurels, Paoli has also been keeping busy making history in the

world of luxury watches. In August 2014, she was appointed the newest ambassador of Bédat & Co, the luxury Swiss watch brand founded by the legendary Madame Simone Bédat. Paoli joins an inspiring lineup of ambassadors that includes Dutch supermodel Yolanda Foster and renowned sculptor-artist Eleanor Cardozo. Her appointment was finalised mere months prior to her stopover in Malaysia.

So how did an English rose with Italian roots end up becoming the newest ambassador for a Swiss luxury timepiece brand? According to Paoli: "I was attending a meeting in London with my manager. It was such a huge honour when they invited me to be the brand's ambassador. It's the single biggest thing that has ever happened to me. Since my appointment, I have lived out a dream that I previously thought was completely out of reach. And it wasn't until I was up there on stage performing with David Foster that I realised dreams really do come true. It has been an experience that was made possible thanks to Bédat & Co. Prime Estates

The private sanctuary of the Estates in Pangkor Laut Resort is a veritable hideaway to reboot, rejuvenate and reconnect in an opulent setting.

The sound of the sea waves lapping onto shore gently lulls you awake. The morning light casts golden streams through the windows, prodding you to rise from bed. You open the door to breathe in the fresh morning air, and a lovely sight of green and blue greets you. Soft footsteps make you turn, only to find your butler in a smart black-and-white uniform bringing you a tray of tempting breakfast treats.

Now, who wouldn't want to wake up to a scene like this every morning? I am staying at Estate One, one of eight private abodes that form the Estates at Pangkor Laut Resort. A gem within a gem, the Estates, which is accessible from Kuala Lumpur by helicopter or via car and luxury yacht, is located less than a five-minute drive (a good 20 to 25 minutes on foot) from the reception area and set within an ancient rainforest. Isolated from the rest of the resort, they are your personal slices of island paradise. Each Estate is a self-contained property, complete with a generous sized pool, a personal attendant and a personal chef. In fact, you don't have to set foot off your Estate if you don't want to.

Ross Sanders, the General Manager of Pangkor Laut Resort, describes the Estates as "the perfect hideaway. Total privacy is the biggest pull here and this begins from the time you arrive until the day you leave. The helicopter pad is located close

to the Estates so that guests can be whisked straight to their rooms without having to encounter anyone else on the island."

The Estates comprises four hill sanctuaries and four beachside properties along the private Marina Bay. The sizes vary from two to four bedrooms. The structures are built around the natural layout of the respective areas, for instance, the sinews of knolls for Estate Seven and the contours of a ridge for Estate Six, with minimal environmental impact. In return, the lush environment shields them from prying eyes. I know this for sure as I try to spot my villa during a cruise around the island but the low hanging branches of the trees along the shoreline of Marina Bay do a great job at hiding it.

Sanders says that the Estates was ahead of its time when it opened in 1998. "It's what I believe to be the first aspirational luxury stays (in the country), a standalone property within the

resort with a great connection to nature." Estate One is one of the smaller properties on the beach, with two sleeping villas that come with their own outdoor jacuzzis, a living pavilion, a dining pavilion and an infinity pool that seemingly flows onto the beach below. It also features a well-maintained garden of palm trees, frangipanis and other leafy plants. (The bigger Estates have the addition of a large lawn, a natural rock garden, a lily pond or, in the case of the hillside Estate Eight, a bedroom with a large balcony overlooking the island.) Everywhere you look is nature, the forest rising high above the villas in the back, and the beach and the sea at your doorstep. The choice of wood and granite rock walls for the exterior allows the buildings to blend seamlessly into the environment.

The tranquility of the outside is replicated inside, complete with a few carefully chosen trappings of luxury. The first thing that captures your attention upon stepping in is the massive poster bed, built into the villa itself, that takes up a large chunk of space in the room. The bed is surrounded on all four sides by a wooden frame that doubles as a 'table' to place your personal effects. In fact, dark red wood is a running theme throughout the villa, from the aforementioned frame to the floor and the cabinets. The spacious bathroom, however, breaks the theme with a marble floor. Decorative pieces such as ethnic

wood sculptures, bronze plates, woven bamboo frames and, fascinatingly enough, an old steel container with a wooden ladle hanging from its side, lend striking character to the informal yet elegant interior design that emphasises ease and functionality. The high ceiling is also a big plus, complete with a ceiling fan that comes in handy on balmy afternoons when you can leave the doors and windows open to let in the sea breeze.

The service is comparable to the tangibles, if not more. An Estate attendant is assigned to take care of your every need. Zayar, who hails from Myanmar, is the gentleman looking after me during my stay, taking on the multiple roles of concierge, driver, problem-solver and, my favourite part, early morning coffee deliverer. Whether it is booking a sunset cruise, ferrying you around the island or even getting you a late-night snack, the service is prompt and precise yet unobtrusive.

Speaking of late-night snacks, you also get your own personal chef who is stationed in the dining pavilion throughout your stay to ensure that every craving is met, no matter how big or small. Whether it is Chinese, Malay, Indian, Japanese or Western, the chef is tasked to deliver a satisfying meal every time, as my experience can attest. For instance, a request for a simple lunch of fried rice comes with the surprising accompaniment of calamari with three types of condiments as well as a sinfully good flourless chocolate cake with vanilla ice cream. The chef also makes the most addictive toasted bread with shrimps for tea, best enjoyed under the shady trees on the beach.

A chat with Zayar reveals that the Estates is extremely popular for family gatherings and get-togethers with friends. Indeed, the separate bedrooms offer some distance and privacy, but the shared compound is ideal for group activities, be it a lazy board game in the living pavilion or a lively barbecue party on the beach. Plus, the seclusion ensures that you won't be bothering anyone else, and vice versa. "The service is one of the best things about the Estates. It has that mix of the crisp European service with the warmth and approachability of Asian hospitality," remarks Sanders.

Time flies when you are having fun. With a cup of Earl Grey in hand, I sit quietly on one of the beach chairs to watch my last sunset here. So, if you will excuse me, I'd like to get back to enjoying this rare moment of solitude.

Our day begins bright and early with a hearty breakfast at Pangkor Laut Resort's Feast Village. This charming beachside restaurant offers an amazing spread of local staples, from Chinese noodle soup and *nasi lemak* to *roti canai* and, surprisingly enough, *appam*, a rice pancake that is crispy around the side with a lovely white soft centre that is eaten with a serving of coconut milk.

As we tuck in, a gentleman in a black chef's uniform approaches our table. He introduces himself as Chef Amiruddin Muhamad and says that he will be taking us on a visit to the neighbouring Pangkor Island to discover where the resort gets its fresh catch from the sea every day. Chef Amiruddin has been working at Pangkor Laut Resort for the last three years after a stint at the JW Marriott in Kuala Lumpur.

(Sea)Food Patrol

Not content with letting you just play 'chef', part of the highlight of the *Chef's Kitchen Experience* lies in a little field excursion organised by the resort, which takes you by speedboat to a fish farm nearby. Here, the phrase 'catch of the day'

takes on new meaning as you are invited to try your hand at catching lunch.

It helps, of course, to pray for a spot of fisherman's luck and our party was indeed blessed with an easy catch of a Taiwanese garoupa hybrid which weighed a whopping 4kgs!

Freshen Up

Back at the resort, we are greeted with a cold towel and refreshing iced lemon tea. But why stop there when the Spa Village offers a unique Bath House Experience? This surprising, but very much welcomed, item on the Chef's Kitchen Experience may have nothing to do with food, unless you count the herbs that make up the aromatically therapeutic bath, but it is delightful nonetheless, serving to re-energise the body after all the walking earlier. Before changing, I am treated to a floral footbath and a Chinese foot pounding session. Later, I change into a batik sarong, the very attire village folks in the old days don when taking a bath by the well or in the river. Up first is the Malay Bath, complete with a pool filled with gushing water from the spouts of oversized canisters. It begins with making a wish at a well, then wading through the cold water before ending with an invigorating inhalation of four different combinations of herbs labelled Passion, Calming, Uplifting and Detox.

Next is the Japanese Bath, where you sit on a stool and scrub your body with the *goshi-goshi* cloth. After this cleansing exercise, you take a dip in the heated rotenburu pool and sip on a small cup of cold green tea. The final act in this ritual is the Shanghai Scrub, using a body brush and rinsing with hot water. Feeling completely refreshed, I get dressed again and head back to the Feast Village for the next item on the agenda, the cooking class.

Wok Station

Chef Kaliama, a 24-year veteran at Pangkor Laut Resort, is already waiting in an open kitchen facing the sea at the Feast Village. A table has also been set up in front of the kitchen for me to eat the lunch that I would be cooking - with help from Chef Kaliama, of course. After donning a chef's hat and an apron, Chef Kaliama announces that today's lunch is Indian and that we would be cooking three dishes (see sidebar for two of

We begin by making *rassam*, a spicy traditional soup that she says is also good for the flu "because there's so much goodness in it." It is essentially a vegetarian dish but Chef Kaliama remarks that some people like adding fish or crab meat to enhance the taste. After this, we make Tandoori Chicken, marinating the meat with yoghurt, lime juice, garlic, ginger, red chilli, black pepper and cumin powder, before cooking it in the oven for about 20 minutes. For best results, Chef Kaliama recommends leaving the marinating chicken in the fridge overnight before cooking. The next dish is Prawn Masala, which involves sautéing the spices in a hot wok before adding vegetable stock and large prawns.

As we sit down for lunch, complete with a fragrant bowl of rice cooked in coconut milk and ginger, Chef Kaliama surprises us with a dish that has been secretly prepared in the back, the garoupa that we caught earlier, wrapped and grilled in banana leaves with onions and chilli. Needless to say, it is a most satisfying meal, especially since I have had a hand in making it. And, to prove it, I am presented with a certificate with my name on it for having completed the Chef's Kitchen Experience.





Tandoori Chicken

- 4 Boneless and skinless chicken drumsticks or breast meat
- 3 Tablespoons lime juice
- ½ Cup plain yoghurt
- 1 Cup garlic and ginger paste
- 1 Tablespoon red chilli powder
- ½ Tablespoon garam masala

Method

- 1. Make deep cuts on the surface of the chicken meat
- Mix yoghurt, lime juice, garlic, ginger, red chilli and garam masala, and pour mixture over the chicken, massaging it into the flesh. Marinate the chicken overnight or at least 30 minutes before cooking.
- 3. Cook chicken in the oven at 202°C for 18 minutes.

Prawn Masala Ingredients

12 Large prawns

- iz Laige prawii
- 1/4 Red onion
- 1 Tomato
- 1 Cup garlic and ginger paste
- ½ Teaspoon cumin powder
- 1 Tablespoon red chilli powder1 Tablespoon curry powder
- 1 Teaspoon turmeric powder
- 3 Curry leaves
- 100ml Vegetable stock

Method

- 1. Heat oil in frying pan.
- 2. Sauté onions, tomatoes, garlic and ginger.
- Add cumin powder, red chilli powder and curry powder, and sauté mixture until well-blended.
- 4. Add prawns and stir-fry until cooked.
- 5. Add vegetable stock and let it simmer.
- 6. Serve hot.



Wild Encounters

Gaya Island Resort is not just a tropical haven for tourists looking for some fun in the sun, but also a sanctuary for wild inhabitants.

The jungle surrounding Gaya Island Resort is a place full of mystery and natural wonders. Covered in magnificent trees and hanging vines, one can only imagine the type of creatures that call this island home. And the best expedition guided by the island's most knowledgeable explorer, resident naturalist Justin Juhun. I was introduced to Juhun back in 2014, after being invited to experience one of the resort's many nature trails. Accompanied by photographer Edmund Lee, we had returned to the resort to investigate a quirky incident involving one of the island's most famous inhabitants – the a dispute with another dominant male. proboscis monkey.

Set Adrift

a boat filled with guests and team members from the resort had stumbled upon a most peculiar sight — an adult male proboscis monkey swimming in the middle of the sea close to the resort. Scott Mayback, the resident marine biologist, was one of the lucky few to have witnessed the incident first-hand.

This approximately three-hour expedition leads to a special platform located deep within the resort's natural backyard, and is the perfect place for adventurous guests looking for an opportunity to natural habitat.

A Hikina We Will Go

resort's Feast Village, we made our way with Juhun and his protégé, a local girl named Ifa. As we prepared ourselves, Juhun pointed out a couple of creatures that had decided to greet us close to

The first was a large beetle that immediately let out a screech upon being picked up by Juhun, who then proceeded to demonstrate how it uses its powerful mandibles to snip off a stem with barely any resistance. The other creature turned out to be a bright green viper hiding amongst the leaves, which prompted Edmund to immediately venture as close as possible for a closer look with his camera. I thought of sneaking a quick peek for myself before deciding against it, just in case the viper decided to snap back.

As we made our way on the trail, I could barely suppress my excitement about the possibility of seeing a live proboscis monkey. Found only in Borneo, the monkey can easily be distinguished by its large, fleshy nose and potbelly. Due to these comical features, the locals decided to bestow the proboscis monkey with the Malay nickname monyet belanda (which translates to Dutch monkey, perhaps as a jibe at the former Dutch colonisers).

Both the males and females have large noses, while the juveniles have small upturned noses. These noses will eventually grow past their mouths, which can make eating quite a challenge. But despite such a setback, this distinguishing feature is necessary for proboscis monkeys to communicate with one another. Not only does the nose swell and turn red whenever the animal becomes excited or angry, but it also acts as a natural resonator, allowing it to vocalise its loud honks, which is used to signal imminent danger.

Proboscises are the largest of the colobine monkeys and survive mostly on leaves. Their large potbellies has a unique digestive system that is similar to that of buffaloes. Their stomach is

cellulose digesting bacteria that can also neutralise the toxins of certain leaves.

Hidden Sanctuary

We were barely an hour into the trail and, yet, I already felt transported far away from the resort's sandy beaches and delicious mocktails served at the Pool Bar. The surrounding jungle foliage is so dense that sunlight can barely peek through the gaps. This is probably a big relief to the various tiny critters scurrying around the muddy trail beneath my feet.



- Both males and females have a long tail, which can easily be the same length as the body. This enables them to balance whilst leaping through the trees.
- Proboscis monkeys are adept swimmers and have partially webbed feet. This is particularly useful for paddling in the water and walking on the slippery banks.
- Due to its large size and almost entirely tree-dwelling lifestyle, proboscis monkeys have very few actual predators in their natural environment.
- Aside from clouded leopards and crocodiles, humans pose the biggest threat to the proboscis monkeys.
- Habitat destruction from logging and oil palm plantations could lead to their extinction in the near future unless better conservation measures are put in place.

While the British have their traditional Sunday Roast, consisting of roast beef, mashed potatoes, boiled veggies and Yorkshire pudding, and the Americans have their backyard barbecue with ribs, burgers, corn on the cob and hot dogs, what speciality do Malaysians offer the entire family for Sunday lunch? Why, the Sunday Curry Tiffin, of course, and where better to experience this delightful and comforting fare than in the nostalgic and elegant Colonial Cafe of The Majestic Hotel Kuala Lumpur.

With a light and airy feel, warm colour scheme and colonial-inspired décor, the Colonial Cafe is a gem in the heart of Kuala Lumpur. Upon entering it, you are transported back to the grandeur and laid-back charm of a bygone era. Divided into two equal sections and separated by The Bar, the cafe boasts cosy banquettes, rattan-backed chairs and crisply starched white table linen, which look inviting enough to persuade the most world-weary traveller or jaded gourmand to hang up his hat and take a breather by trying out some of the restaurant's signature colonial dishes, the Sunday Curry Tiffin being one of its highlights.

If the weather isn't too warm, sit under the sky light and catch the rays of the mid-day sun while you feast on the dishes, making sure you also order a tall, cool beer to quench your thirst. If you arrive early, The Bar is the place to head for. Sit on one of the stools under the gold-leafed domed ceiling and order the *Tanqueray Blue*, *Malayan Colada* or *Straits Sling*, often rumoured to be the precursor to the *Singapore Sling* and specially created by Johnnie the barman. Ask him how The Bar's signature cocktail, *Code 55 and 2 Bulat*, came about and you might be surprised by how this beer, lemonade, gin and whiskey concoction got its name.

Finish your Sunday Tiffin Curry Lunch at The Majestic Kuala Lumpur's Colonial Cafe with a nice glass of masala tea. We visited the Colonial Cafe recently and were escorted to our table in the centre, the perfect vantage point for people"The Colonial Cafe boasts cosy banquettes, rattanbacked chairs and crisply starched white table linen, which look inviting enough to tempt even the most world-weary traveller."

watching. The dulcet tones of Isabella Soliano filled the restaurant with upbeat jazz classics, creating a light-hearted and toe-tapping mood. Soon, the friendly staff showed us the cafe's eclectic menu. Comprising mainly colonial-era inspired dishes such as Mulligatawny (spiced peppery broth with Indian spices and lentils), Hainanese Chicken Chop and Traditional Hainanese Boiled Beef, the menu also has perennial favourites such as Lobster Thermidor, Chateaubriand and Bread and Butter Pudding.

We were here, however, to try the Sunday Curry Tiffin Lunch and that was what we ordered. Once the order was taken, each of our plates was lined with banana leaf. An assortment of chutneys and condiments were placed around the leaf after some steamed rice was offered. An explosion of colours, textures and aromas accompanied this appetite-inducing ritual as no Sunday Curry Tiffin is complete without these mouthwatering appetite-whetters. Mango chutney, pineapple slices, fish *puttu*, salted eggs, toasted coconut, toasted salted peanuts, marinated cucumbers and banana crisps provided a visual fare and are only a precursor of more tempting dishes to come.

A choice of salted *lassi* or *masala* tea is offered and I ordered the former, its cool and thirst-quenching creamy flavour providing an antidote to the mid-day sun. Soon after, the main dishes arrived. They came in a brass and porcelain tiffin carrier – circular bowls stacked one on top of the other and secured by a brass stand. Consisting of five dishes – Hainanese Chicken Curry, Mutton Varuval, Egg Masala, Fried Masala Fish and Crispy Bitter Gourd – this balanced selection went well with the assortment of condiments: the sweetness of the chutney harmonising with the spices in the chicken curry, the tartness of the pineapple slices balancing the thick and pungent mutton, the coolness of the marinated cucumber complementing the fiery fried fish and the crunchy saltiness of the toasted peanuts bringing out

the piquant Egg Masala. The crispy bitter gourd proved to be a hit and a second serving was requested. All in all, the food was an explosion of different flavours and tastes for the palate, something which will definitely awaken any taste buds that have been dulled or deadened by bland and unimaginative fare.

Dessert came in the form of Sago Gula Melaka, presented in a cocktail glass and a refreshingly sweet contrast to the savoury dishes earlier. With a cup of warm *masala* tea to end the meal, we left the Colonial Cafe happy and satiated.

HISTORY OF SUNDAY CURRY TIFFIN IN MALAYSIA

With the advent of colonisation and the British Empire expanding its imperial powers globally, it was inevitable that the customs and cultures of the countries they colonised would find their way into British life. Food, being very much a part of any country's culture, was probably one of the first noticeable influences that was adopted by the British colonial elite posted to the Far East.

When the East India Company spread its reach to Asia in the 18th century and, later, when India came under British rule, curry became omnipresent in the British diet and was a favourite dish among British merchants and army officers. Soon, this spicy gravy became a highlight of any colonial menu and was referred to as 'Indian Tiffin' in the subcontinent or the 'Sunday Tiffin' in Borneo, Malaya and Singapore.

The word 'tiffin' originated from British India and is probably a derivative of the obsolete English slang 'tiffing', meaning to take a light drink or sip. The word emerged when Indian custom superseded the British practice of an afternoon tea, leading to a new word for the afternoon meal. Indeed, the British in India referred to tiffin as a light lunch and the Sunday Tiffin was a relaxed and languorous affair.

Comprising several dishes such as chicken, beef, mutton, prawn, fish and vegetable curry as well as several side dishes called *sambals*, which could number as many as 20, the Sunday Curry Tiffin is undoubtedly not for the

minimalist. The side dishes are usually prawn crackers, eggs, peanuts, cucumber marinated in coconut milk, sliced onion, desiccated coconut, sliced banana, diced tomatoes, raisins and mango chutney, among others.

Served mainly on the balconies or verandas in the homes of the British elites, the Sunday Curry Tiffin was also served in many restaurants, clubs and hotels the British frequented. With the arrival of the Chinese from the Hainan province of China, many who took up employment as cooks and chefs in the private homes of the expatriate community, the Sunday Curry Tiffin served in Malaya and Singapore took on its own twists and tastes, with these Hainanese chefs adding their own ingredients and reinterpreting the Curry Tiffin.

Often served in imported English crockery with beer as the standard drink of choice, the Sunday Curry Tiffin has earned its place in the culinary history of Malaya and Singapore, not just as a traditional Sunday feast but also as one of the longest meals of the week, which is looked forward to by all who indulge in it.

Gin Up!

For a true taste of Malaysia's most historical state, saunter over to The Bar at The Mansion for a hat-trick of delicious tipples, all made with mythical *Malacca Gin*.

Few drinks are as evocative as gin. Perhaps it's the unique flavour of the juniper berries or the head-spinning bouquet of botanicals that transform mere drink to liquid poetry but for the world's many gin-lovers, no other drink would do. Although simple in essence – even its name is a basic derivative of the word "juniper" in several languages, including *jenever* (Dutch), *ginepro* (Italian) and *genièvre* (French) – its potency is not to be sniffed at. Writers have long raved about gin's qualities, with some claiming a gin cocktail done right has the ability to transform boys to men and Joe Bloggs to James Bond.

Essentially, a neutral grain spirit, gin has the ability to morph into a cornucopia of delights. It is a must, however, to begin with good-quality gin. Of course, imbibing neat gin is an acceptable pleasure but, given its aromatic composite of berries and botanicals, which may range from bitter orange peel, anise and angelica root to elderflower, hibiscus, nutmeg and saffron, in the right hands (ie a talented mixologist), gin can turn into the nectar of the gods.

Of the several famous gin-producing names, Tanqueray is always a good bet. With several iterations to offer, many gin-lovers still hold a candle to its *Malacca Gin* – a sweeter botanical blend that is currently sought-out by many gin-obsessed bartenders around the world. First introduced in 1997 as a "wetter alternative" to its London Dry, Tanqueray's *Malacca Gin* has a distinctively sweeter, fruitier palate. Although discontinued, Tanqueray has released limited edition cases of this well-loved gin a couple of times because of overwhelming response from bartenders.

If you're looking to knock back a classic martini or to just enjoy it with tonic water and lemon, a classic London dry gin might suit your needs better. But, if you're feeling slightly adventurous and willing to let the friendly face behind the bar take you places without leaving the perch of your stool, take a trip with *Malacca Gin*. Oh, the places you'll go. **M**

Bernie Takes A Break

One of Malaysia's most well-known faces, emcee, model and actress Bernie Chan has been gracing magazine covers and runways for a while now, appearing on countless glossies as well as in TV commercials, theatre production in Kuala Lumpur well as Singapore, and in television programmes in Australia and Germany. Together with her brother Henry, they fought, cried and entertained drive, the driver will thoughtfully ask which viewers in the third season of the reality show, The Amazing Race Asia. She says her love for travelling started when she began modeling all those years ago and realised how much she loves new sights, sounds and food. Here, she shares excerpts from the diary of her stay at the of the journey. Spa Village Resort Tembok, Bali.

My flight touched down at Denpasar's Ngurah Rai International Airport in the afternoon, and we were greeted by staff from the Spa Village Resort Tembok, Bali. We were then ushered into a waiting van for the long drive north. The ride came equipped with bottled water and snacks - a nice touch - and, as it is quite a long

route you'd prefer - the coastal road or through the heart of Bali, via Ubud. I love Ubud and its verdant surroundings, so I plumped for the inland route. Luck wasn't on my side, though, as it began to rain heavily, obliterating the view for most parts

For those who don't like long car rides or hilly terrain, the journey could prove a little gruelling, so it is a good idea to pack along some assam boi (preserved salted plums) to nibble on or even some essential oils to keep spirits up. The Ubud route is scenic, bypassing beautiful nurseries selling intricate stone carvings for the garden as well as emerald green padi fields and the ubiquitous temples. But the rain also brought mist and, this time around, we really couldn't see much at all. It was early evening when we finally drove past a long bamboo-lined driveway to arrive at the Spa Village Resort Tembok, Bali.

Upon arrival at the resort, I was immediately seated and treated to a much-appreciated foot bath and scrub, using black volcanic sand from the beach - the resort's signature welcome ritual. I'd seen black sand years ago when I was in Tahiti for a modelling assignment. It brought back lovely memories. I was also given a much-needed neck and shoulder massage, which immediately did the trick, removing all the stiffness from the travelling that day, not to mention helping to put me in a spa frame of mind. I immediately checked into my suite and changed into something loose and comfortable as, first up on my itinerary, was a visit to the spa!

To get to the spa, you walk past lovely gardens and it is all very nature-oriented and peaceful. Every spa treatment, for

example, uses the bounty of the garden; from bright and beautiful blossoms for a ritual flower bath to ylang-ylang flowers, with their cute curly ends, for tonic drinks. My experience began with the Segara Giri, which means 'ocean' and 'mountain' in Balinese, a respectful nod to the resort's location in-between the Bali Sea and the island's mother mountain, Gunung Agung. Here, my feet and lower leas were steamed in a purpose-built pit filled with hot volcanic black sand, which the locals believe is a way of purifying oneself from negative energy, as the feet act as a conduit between one's energy and that of the earth itself. An attendant popped in shortly to hand me es bola (ice balls doused in palm syrup) to suck on. Spa life here is certainly indulgent!

My masseuse, Luh Muli, then led me to a treatment room where, for one glorious hour, I was kneaded, pressed and rubbed to near-heaven. Her touch was excellent - intuitive yet firm and the perfect antidote to rattled nerves and stressful city living. The treatment ended with a warm jamu (herbal) drink of turmeric, tamarind juice and palm sugar delicious and the perfect post-treatment treat! The sweetness didn't end there. When I returned to my suite, I found the staff - all lovely Tembok locals - had run a flower bath for me, using a variety of flowers, each with different uplifting qualities. After a short rest, I strolled down to the Wantilan Restaurant for dinner and enjoyed a simple supper of pumpkin soup, the catch of the day and a particularly delicious chocolate fondant. The set menu changes daily, so it is nice knowing each meal offers new surprises, much like returning to one's suite nightly to find little presents - a poem, a few sweets - left by the staff here.

Day 2

My day started early with an exploratory walk on the rocky, pebbly beach. I chose some beautiful specimens as souvenirs and marvelled at the beach's beautiful dark sand. I kept thinking how strange and wonderful it was to see a truly beautiful black sand beach after almost 20 years. I even waded into the water but didn't go too far as the waves were rough. After filling my lungs with fresh, salty sea air, I headed back to the resort for a healthy breakfast. At 10am, it was time for another spa treatment - this time, the *Penganten Melukat*, part of a bride-to-be's grooming ritual. Although no wedding bells are ringing for me anytime soon, I still had fun being pampered from head to toe!

A traditional *boreh* paste of galangal, rice, ginger and clove was first smeared all over me. After a minute or two, you'd feel the effects of the herbs gently heating up on your skin, and it is a really nice feeling. As the skin tingles and the body warms up, your therapist then uses fresh milk to rub it all off. All you need is a light rinse to realise how good your skin feels after this treatment. But the sybaritic pleasure didn't end there as a long, soothing massage brought the experience to a suitable close.

After downing my jamu tonic as well as a few iced strawberries, I went over to the lovely infinity pool to read. I liked that you could hide within the billowing curtains of an outdoor pavilion or simply find a seat in the sun. After lunch, Chef Martin Büchele, who looks after all the resort's F&B, took me to visit a local cashew nut factory, just a short drive away. It felt unnerving to leave the sanctuary of the resort, but it was also exciting to explore and observe all the noise and colour of the outside world. A celebration had just ended at a nearby temple and I loved seeing the women, beautiful in their colourful lace kebaya and bright sashes, milling about or riding side-saddle on motorcycles heading home. We also had to drive through the village to get to the factory and it is amazing how clean and neat everything

is. The Balinese take great pride in their homes and surroundings, so it was very much a visual treat for me. The path then goes off-road for a bit before you come to the factory. Set up by Aaron Fishman, a young American who first came to Bali as a volunteer and then found his heart belonged to the mystical island, the factory initially opened in October 2012 to help provide employment for the local women.

The entire surrounding area is covered with thousands of cashew nut trees and is a positively thriving business. Not limited to just women, the factory has since grown to be a source of livelihood for the entire community, with the men roped in to see to the harvesting, while the women take over once the haul reaches the factory. I learnt it is quite a tedious process preparing cashew nuts as the raw fruit is toxic and needs to undergo a thorough cleansing and preparation process drying, which may take up to five days, steaming, hulling and, finally, roasting before it is safe for consumption. I peeped into the storerooms and was greeted by the sight of thousands upon thousands of gunny sacks filled with the delicious nuts! I was also shown around the premises and saw that the factory was indeed a blessing for the community.

A daycare centre, complete with teachers, sits on-site, ensuring the younger children, from one to six years of age, are taught and cared for while their mums work. There is also a play area, a chicken run and soon-to-be-ready rabbit hutch. I can imagine what a relief it must be for the women to be able to work, supplementing their families' incomes, knowing their kids are nearby and well looked-after. I later learnt that, just 7km away, up in the hills, lay villages that still had no access to running water or electricity.

So, it was heartening, yet sobering, for me – a city girl through and through – to see the impact the factory has on the lives of villagers here. Chef Martin took the opportunity to collect his supply of organic vegetables, all purchased from the local

Before dinner, I decided to try out a session of Hatha Yoga, which was conducted in a lovely, wall-less pavilion where we enjoyed our practice to the music of crickets and cicadas. I hadn't practised in a while so it was a great feeling being able to stretch and sweat for a bit. I'd wanted to indulge in a spot of star-gazing (a popular pastime here) before calling it a night, but heavy cloud cover ensured I got to bed early.

Day 3

I'd initially planned to visit the famous Ponjok Batu temple to undergo a purification ritual but, instead, found my way to Les Waterfall nearby. It is a beautiful walk up to the falls - hardly a hike and which can be easily done with flip-flops. It is an incredibly picturesque part of the island and gives visitors - particularly jaded city-slickers - an up-close look at real village life. I also judge a town by the way their animals are treated and, here, I observed how friendly and happy the animals seemed to be. Cats and dogs lazed about together and were clearly not threatened at all by human life, content to sun themselves and watch the wind blow!

There were a few village girls enjoying an invigorating swim and I immediately realised how surreal life seemed that instant. There I was, living in luxury in my spa resort suite yet was given access also to all these basic, earthy pleasures. I feasted my eyes on the beautiful bamboo forests all around me and took stock of the clove, rubber, cashew and fruit trees all around. How rich life seemed here! It made me realise you don't need all that much to be happy.

The afternoon was spent at Taman Gili, the resort's name for the pavilion around which most handicraft activities are centred. The activity of the afternoon was candle-making and I enjoyed the opportunity to chat with the friendly resort staff, this time, to Mustika, a trainee masseuse who also doubles-up teaching arts and crafts whenever she is free. Under her guidance, I managed to make a candle, using just beeswax paraffin and moulds, which resembled a camellia. Candle-making proved surprisingly easy and fun, and it felt good being able to create something with my own hands; an increasingly-rare pleasure in this fastpaced, digital world. What I also enjoy about staying at Spa Village Resort Tembok, Bali is that it celebrates the simple - yet meaningful and enriching things in life.

My entire day so far had been immersed in waterfalls and traditional crafts. The resort also provides guests with a full calendar of activities throughout their stay. So, if you're not content to while away the days by the poolside, there's so much to occupy your time and attention – from yoga to cooking classes, candle-making and more. It is nice to know you can easily reconnect with what's important here.

The spa beckoned again after a healthy lunch, this time, a three-point massage and a flower scrub. I was getting used to this routine by now. After close to two hours of being massaged and bathed with

and that there's always a better way to eat and live. I then cheekily suggested serving the ice-cream as dessert of the day to the guests that night. All I could hear from Chef Martin was nervous laughter!

My last evening in Tembok was spent cruising in a jukong. Resembling a catamaran. I was a little nervous at first as I'd never been in one but, once my life jacket was on, I was 'king' of the sea! It is a strange vessel - very narrow - and even my long legs were dangling off the floor. The sea was choppy and the sky overcast, so we didn't get the majestic sunset we'd hoped for. I asked how deep the sea was here and, as the boatman told us it was well over 100m, my knees suddenly felt weak. Just as I wanted to head back to land, he shouted to us to look ahead and, there, we spotted the fins and tails of a small pod of dolphins.

We felt chuffed as they are rare to spot during the monsoon. I also learnt whales can sometimes be seen during the right season and I couldn't help but felt blessed enough to have seen dolphins on my very last day.

I also tried my hand at playing the *rindik*– a traditional bamboo instrument –
before dinner that evening, enjoying its
calming, almost hypnotic, music. Here

in Tembok, I found myself falling into a deep sleep every night, from as early as 10pm – something that would never have happened back in Kuala Lumpur. I'd been suffering from a nagging body ache prior to my Bali trip but, here, it went away easily, with no fuss. I'd also been eating healthy, enjoyed rejuvenating spa treatments and restorative tonics and juices with every meal and, generally, doing things that were good for both body and soul. I slept well and deeply and I just... breathed.

Day 4

With the long journey home imminent, I decided to go for a brisk walk on the beach. I walked for about 2km, not far at all, but given the beach's rocky terrain, it was a good distance. I saw the fishermen coming in already and I made the most of my time, soaking up all the sights and sounds of this special part of Bali, where sun, jungle, sea and mountain all came together beautifully. It was a special experience for me, discovering this new corner of an island I've always loved. I'd experienced so many facets of Balinese holidays, from surfing trips to the vibe of Seminyak and even homestays. But, this was different - calming, peaceful, restful and a place to really detox from all the stress of a fast-paced life. It was a retreat, I am sure, my mind, body and soul truly appreciated.



So, despite knowing I could cook, I wasn't asked into the kitchen. Instead, we focused on easy, no-cooking-required recipes like making fresh cashew nut milk and raw vegan ice-cream. I'm not a big fan of dairy, although I do like cheese and cakes, and I normally take oat or rice milk anyway. So, learning how to make cashew nut milk proved most useful. I also thought the vegan ice-cream, made with locally-grown vanilla pods, tasted amazing – high praise indeed for someone who's nowhere near vegan!

The resort also contains the essence of locavorism at its best. Everything, from the spa to the kitchen, uses locally sourced produce, many coming from its very gardens. I also enjoyed being shown another example of how healthy food could indeed prove most delicious;



In The Footsteps of Isabella Lucy Bird

Embark on an epic spa journey with The Majestic Spa by Spa Village's *Malaya Golden Chersonese* experience, inspired by intrepid author and explorer Isabella Lucy Bird's travels around the Malay Peninsula in the 1800s.

It's not often that the gateway to a journey inspired by a fearless woman explorer begins amidst elegant architecture and with a refreshing glass of Pimm's-spiked lemonade; but those who have enjoyed The Majestic Spa's *Malaya Golden Chersonese* spa experience can attest that adventures of a softer kind may be had.

One of the spa's signature experiences, the *Malaya Golden Chersonese*, designed for both couples as well as individuals, celebrates the epic journey of Isabella Lucy Bird. Born in 1831 in North Yorkshire, England, Bird, the eldest daughter of a clergyman, was born frail and sickly. One day, when her doctor suggested that a sea voyage might do her some good,

the intrepid Bird, armed with GBP100 in her pocket, took the first step into an adventure that she would replicate time and time again over the course of her life.

Beginning with America, Bird travelled her way through most parts of the world – an incredible feat considering she was a single white woman as well as the conventions of the day. Not only did Bird see the world, all the while battling health issues, she also made a career for herself as a writer, publishing books based on her journeys and adventures, many of which were hugely successful.

One of her most famous, however, was the chronicles of her time spent in British Malaya, which went on to be published under the title *The Golden Chersonese*, the ancient name used by Greek geographer Ptolemy in reference to the Malay Peninsula.

It is in her honour that The Majestic Spa by Spa Village offers a thoroughly pampering 2.5-hour spa ritual called *Malaya Golden Chersonese*. To be enjoyed alone or with a special someone, this inviting experience begins, as all The Majestic Spa's treatments do, with a welcome drink of lemonade, fortified with a shot of fruity Pimm's, or a non-alcoholic alternative of ginger ale and ginger beer.

You are invited to relax in the salon which, architectural enthusiasts might recognise as a discreet homage to the great Charles Rennie Mackintosh's famous Willow Tea Rooms in Glasgow. As you slowly but surely feel the stresses of city life fade away, which you undoubtedly will after lounging amidst the serene surroundings, it is time to don a waffle-weave robe to follow Bird's footsteps, albeit from a decidedly sybaritic stance.

Every treatment at The Majestic Spa begins with a pre-spa ritual. And here, taking into account The Majestic Hotel Kuala Lumpur's colonial past, it is done with a Victorian twist. After changing, your therapist will lead you upstairs to a secluded lounge, where she will first bathe and scrub your feet with warm, lavender-scented water and lavender buds, to be followed by a scalp massage using rosemary hair tonic. This not only works to stimulate circulation and to refresh the scalp, but it also serves to get you into the right (and relaxed) frame of mind with which to begin the spa journey.

Once done, your ever gracious therapist will put your slippers on for you before leading you to the treatment room, where the first part of your *Malaya Golden Chersonese* adventure begins with a series of deep, relaxing breathing exercises before being rewarded with a neck and shoulder massage.

My therapist, Shaidatul, possessed extremely intuitive fingers, knowing exactly where the kinks and knots were hidden. She then applied blended fresh banana, coconut cream and honey as a cooling, fragrant hair masque, all the while with the faint melody of traditional gamelan music playing in the background. As the masque is left to set, you are then slathered with a mixture of papaya, grated coconut and coconut milk, which is then left to work its magic as you drift away in a bliss-induced haze. After about 20 minutes, Shaidatul returned to slough everything off, leaving the skin feeling soft and incredibly smooth.

A quick rinse in the shower precedes a languorous soak in a traditional Victorian clawfoot bath. It might seem incongruous to take a hot bath in a tropical climate but, I can assure you, it is delightful. It felt like all the cares of the world are melting away as you slowly sink into the warm, limescented waters.

The highlight of any spa treatment for me is a good massage and, here, Shaidatul did not disappoint. Initially beginning with long flowing strokes, which she administered with the use of her elbows and forearms,

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it segued into expert fingerwork, applied consciously around key problem areas like the shoulders and neck. As you dip in and out of consciousness, you barely notice the passage of time until you are gently awaken and invited to slip on your robe once again, before being led to the changing room, out of the treatment area and, alas, back into reality.

As we said before, it's not often someone as fearless and adventurous as a 19th-century woman explorer is linked to the pleasurable world of spa traditions and treatments. But The Majestic Spa's *Malaya Golden Chersonese* offers modern-day personages the chance to re-imagine Bird's Malayan experiences – albeit through rose-tinted glasses and, might we add, scented with lavender and essential oils.





Flight of The Bird

A quick look at the life and times of Isabella Lucy Bird.

1831

Isabella Bird was born on 15 October at Boroughbridge Hall, North Yorkshire, the eldest daughter of a clergyman, the same year Victor Hugo publishes *The Hunchback of Notre-Dame*, and Charles Darwin sails off on the *HMS Beagle* on an epic voyage.

1856

Bird's American journey proved to be such a success that she was inspired to publish a book of her experiences, titled *An Englishwoman in America*. Meanwhile, in Dublin, the great dramatist George Bernard Shaw is born.

1873

Bird revisits America and explores the Rocky Mountains as well as successfully climb Long's Peak. Across the pond, in the French town of Yonne, a girl named Sidonie-Gabrielle Colette is born. She would go on to be one of France's best-loved and most enigmatic novelists, producing works like the *Claudine* series as well as the celebrated *Gigi*.

1880

Bird's restless feet take her onwards to Japan, Indonesia and the Middle East, which resulted in yet another title – *Unbeaten Tracks in Japan*. Back home, William Ewart Gladstone becomes Prime Minister for the second time, beating out Benjamin Disraeli in the British general elections.

1904

Isabella Bird passes away in Edinburgh, Scotland, at the age of 73. Still a time of great discoveries, Egyptologist Ernesto Schiaparelli discovers the tomb of the legendary Nefertari which, today, remains one of the largest and most spectacular in the Valley of the Queens.



1854

At the age of 23, Bird embarks on a journey to America as Charles Dickens begins work on *Hard Times*.

1872

Despite poor health, Bird embarks on yet another adventure – this time to Australia and Hawaii, where she climbed an active volcano. Back in America, Yellowstone National Park is established, making it the world's first national park.

1879

Bird's next book, *A Lady's Life in the Rocky Mountains*, is published. Over in New Jersey, the Wizard of Menlo Park, Thomas Alva Edison, demonstrates the first-ever practical light bulb model in public.

1883

The publication of one her most famous books, *The Golden Chersonese*, details much of her travels and personal sketches around old Malaya, including the then-British colony of Singapore as well as the jungles of the Malay Peninsula, further bolstering her reputation as an intrepid explorer as well as paving the way for Bird to become the Royal Geographical Society's first woman fellow. In the Dutch East Indies, now Indonesia, the volcano Krakatoa erupts – one of the most violent and ferocious recorded in history.

A Shot Of Scotch

You might have read how Japanese whiskies recently came out tops, beating even the best Scottish names. If your schedule permits, make it a point to visit one. Nikka, one of Japan's top names in whisky, has a distillery in Yoichi, a short drive from Niseko, with an interesting story to tell. It was set up in 1934 by Masataka Taketsuru, widely acknowledged as the founding father of Japanese whisky, together with his Scottish wife, Rita Cowan. At Yoichi, it's an opportunity to sample their entire liquid portfolio.





Niseko Village is wonderful for all levels of skiers. Beginners would benefit from our world-class ski school and friendly slopes. But if you are already an experienced skier, I tell you nothing beats the pleasure of skiing off-piste on fresh powder snow. I have just gone for a session and it was as if I were heli-skiing. The snow was second to none and the experience was most exhilarating. The off-piste runs around here are safe but still challenging. You must, however, always make sure to go with a guide.





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Seafood Diet

I love sashimi and Yang Shu Ten, also within our new F&B and retail village, serves awesome food. The cold sea off Hokkaido offers a mind-boggling array of seafood and you can't come to Niseko Village without eating here. I know the restaurant owner, Yasuo Takahashi, personally. He's an old friend who had decided to retire to Hokkaido. I always enjoy going to his place. I think the name of his restaurant says it all. Yang Shu means 'fisherman' in the local Ainu language while Ten, in Japanese, alludes to the best.

From superb skiing to delectable cuisine, Niseko Village is a holidaymaker's dream.

A Yen For Yakitori Just a short drive away from Niseko Village in the town of Kutchan is Torimatsu, one of the best places to indulge in *yakitori* (grilled chicken). It's part *izakaya* (casual places for after-work drinking), part *yakitori* restaurant, and is a top favourite with locals and visitors alike. Even the famous food personality, Anthony Bourdain, has found his way to Torimatsu! This is a must-go place.

Feeling Crabby

I don't know about you but, after a day on the slopes, few things beat tucking into a seafood barbeque feast at the **Crab Shack**. I love eating here, seeing my fresh seafood grilled right before me on the table. You can do it yourself or have the chefs prepare it for you, seasoned with their special sauces like *shoyu* and *mirin*. The variety is astounding – from amazing abalone to gigantic king crab. This is the real deal.

Hit The Sticks

If there's ski, there's got to be après-ski. And Two Sticks, also at the new village, has it all. Good music, a great space within which to chill out and some spice – literally. We have a chef there who's a pro at preparing all the best South-East Asian dishes, from *laksa* to chicken rice and even Hokkien fried noodles.
