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Call Of The Wild

Get ready for a wild weekend of sun, sea and serenity at Gaya Island Resort.

Strolls in the park, picnics in the garden or relaxing under the shade of a rustling tree: nature in all its splendour can indeed have a profound effect on one's senses and overall wellbeing. As the legendary naturalist and television presenter Sir David Frederick Attenborough once said: "It seems to me that the natural world is the greatest source of excitement; the greatest source of visual beauty; the greatest source of intellectual interest. It is the greatest source of so much in life that makes life worth living". And for those yearning to experience all this for themselves, a weekend getaway amidst the luxurious trappings offered at **Gaya Island Resort** is the perfect place to be.

Land Below The Wind

Nestled right next to the sleepy oceanfront city of Kota Kinabalu, capital of the Malaysian state of Sabah that occupies the northern part of Borneo, Gaya Island has long served as an oasis of flourishing seascapes and vibrant wildlife. Prized for its sandy beaches, coral reefs and lush tropical landscape, this floating paradise is the largest among the five isles that reside in the protected mini-archipelago that makes up Tunku Abdul Rahman National Park. Measuring approximately 3,700 acres, the name of Gaya Island is believed to be derived from the Bajau word for 'big' (gayo).

Besides being rich in fauna and flora, what also makes this floating mass of land so significant is its historical significance. It was in 1882, a year after the British North Borneo Company was given a mandate to rule over Sabah (then known as Jesselton), that a trading settlement was established on the island – quite an

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impressive feat once you consider the challenges these settlers must have encountered while transporting the various building materials from the mainland. Alas, this proud settlement would ultimately meet with a bitter end when, in 1897, it was razed to the ground following a revolt led by the local folk hero Mat Salleh, whose legendary struggles against the British rule would culminate with the founding of Kota Kinabalu itself.

Following the incident, Gaya Island remained relatively untouched for over a century until exclusive private retreat aptly named Gaya Island Resort was created. Surrounded by trappings of luxury, it is within this exotic paradise that travellers can not only relax and unwind, but also escape from the humdrum of everyday urban life by reconnecting with Mother Nature.

Adventure Awaits

Located a mere 15 minutes away from the mainland, the journey to this majestic property is an experience that begins with a speedy boat ride from the city's bustling ferry terminal, Jesselton Point, and involves circumventing massive fishing boats in all colours of the rainbow plus the occasional wayward sampan (flat-bottomed boats with oars).

As you approach the crystalline waters of Malohom Bay, the thrilling joy-ride culminates with a glorious view of the island retreat that blends harmoniously with the surrounding lush tropical jungle that embraces the sand and sea, as well as glimpses of the villas scattered throughout the property, each categorised based on the different views available. Depending on one's preference, guests can choose to wake up to the sights and sounds of tranquil mangrove forests, the surrounding jungle canopy or the distinctive peak of the legendary Mount Kinabalu.

Measuring in at a staggering 4,095m, this revered symbol of Sabah is believed to have existed for at least 15 million years during the Pliocene period. A monument of pluton, a granite mound said to exist deep beneath the Earth's crust, it might have lost its status as the tallest mountain in South-East Asia (that title now belongs to the 5,881m high Hkakabo Razi mountain in Myanmar), but many locals still retain a deep respect for this rocky behemoth. According to Kadazan lore, Mount Kinabalu is the resting place for souls bound for heaven, which is also why most locals refer to it as Aki Nabalu, which translates to 'the revered place of the departed'.

Nurture & Nature

Upon arrival at the resort, guests will be ushered to the grand lobby area, where they will be greeted by a cheerful *Kopivosian!* (welcome), before being served a refreshingly cold beverage as the resort's helpful porters assist in delivering their luggage to the rooms. Distinguished by its giant pillars, sumptuous seating areas and high wooden ceiling, the lobby is also the place where guests



can sign up for a variety of recreational activities that immerse them into the various scents, textures, sounds and tastes that make up Borneo's diverse cultural heritage, which is deeply rooted in the local wilderness.

As one can probably surmise at this point, nature plays a starring role at Gaya Island Resort. Not only are there several eco-friendly initiatives in place, ranging from conservation through education to wildlife rescue programmes, but the resort also offers a plethora of interesting activities and incredible experiences that highlight the enchanting beauty of the island's natural surroundings – and a great place to begin this quest for knowledge will be by visiting the brand new **Gaya Island Wildlife Centre**.

Situated in a two-storey building perched atop a hillside, the centre was the brainchild of resident senior naturalist and walking encyclopaedia, Justin Juhun. Located just above the **Omakase** Japanese restaurant, the centre might appear modest at first but a closer look will reveal intrigue hiding in every corner, including tables showcasing several species of jewel-like insects; a gallery that lists the various animal species indigenous to the island; and fascinating displays of mineral collections, meteorite-like rocks and fossilised wood.

According to Juhun, the main purpose of this facility is to allow guests on the island to familiarise themselves with the island's diverse wildlife as well as the resort's various conservation







programmes, with two nature talks conducted each week. Among the recent initiatives undertaken by Juhun and his team is a wildlife rescue project that involved collaborating with the Sabah Wildlife Department and Sabah Park to translocate endangered proboscis monkeys from nearby islands to Gaya Island as a way of increasing their dwindling population.

The wildlife centre also functions as a place where injured animals found throughout the premises can recuperate in peace. During this writer's visit, Juhun introduced a collared scops owl (otus lettia) that had been delivered to the centre after the frail creature was discovered with an injured eye. "We've since decided to nickname him 'One Eye'. He likes to perch on this tree so that he can greet our guests," he jokes. For Juhun, Gaya Island not only serves as a sanctuary for the resort's guests, but also for the natural inhabitants that reside in the nearby rainforest, which includes a variety of exotic species of plant and animal life that are in dire need of rescue.

Having spent most of his childhood growing up in the jungle, Juhun is grateful for having witnessed Mother Nature in all her wondrous splendour. This also explains why he is so passionate about





preserving it for future generations as time is of the essence. "I am looking forward to expanding this wildlife centre, as it will enable us to broaden the resort's conservation activities. In a developing world, nature is the one that suffers the most. From land clearing to support the needs of economy, pollution, illegal wildlife trafficking and harvesting of natural resources plus many other unsustainable practices... unless we do our part to intensify conservation efforts, the Earth will come to an end – and once that happens, everything else will perish along with it."

When not manning the centre, Juhun and his team also conduct daily **nature walks** that offer guests a golden opportunity to uncover the mysteries of the ancient dipterocarp forest that resides in the resort's backyard. The journey involves traversing various trails that have been installed as a way to minimise human intrusion. Hiking enthusiasts will especially enjoy taking on the **Tavajun Trek**. Hiking shoes are definitely a must for this voyage of discovery, which involves journeying through trickling streams, rocky terrain, undulating vines, scratchy rattans, prickly palms, tiny shrubs and massive hardwood trees. Lasting a good 45 minutes, the trail leads to the resort's private beach known as **Tavajun Bay**, home of the **Gaya Island Marine Centre**.

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Making A Splash

First established in October 2013, this research centre is manned by the resort's resident marine biologist, Scott Mayback, and focuses on all things to do with marine conservation. Inside are several glowing tanks housing a variety of intriguing corals that play an important role for the biodiversity of sea life, while a massive 14,000-litre recovery tank designed for housing sick and injured sea turtles greets visitors at the entrance. According to Mayback, the purpose of the tank was to enable sea turtles to recuperate in a safe and controlled environment as a way to increase their chances of survival. Believed to have existed since the time of the dinosaurs, these gentle creatures have become increasingly endangered as a result of poaching, loss of coastal habitat and commercial fishing. Since the launch of the marine centre, a total of 10 turtles have been rescued with five successfully rehabilitated and released back into the ocean – and, for any true-blue thalassophile, to be

able to witness such a spectacle would indeed be worth crossing off the bucket list. "We also recently launched a turtle hatchery in our sister property in Tanjong Jara, and that experience has to be one of my favourite highlights this year. The guests were so excited to watch these little turtle hatchlings emerge from the nest."

As for his take on the resort's new wildlife centre, Mayback was amazed to learn that Juhun and his passionate team had managed to accomplish such a feat within six months with little outside assistance. "The guests who visit the wildlife centre will surely appreciate the educational experience," he adds. As for his own plans for the marine centre, Mayback intends to establish more coral planting activities to help rejuvenate the surrounding reef while also working with local schools on the mainland to launch new recycling programmes.

Holistic Healing

After a long day of getting to know the resort's wild side, a great way to cap your island adventure would be to include in a little rest and relaxation at the award-winning **Spa Village Gaya Island**. Located a mere three-minute walk from the wildlife centre, this pampering retreat offers a variety of sumptuous spa treatments inspired by the traditional healing customs that have been practiced by the indigenous people of Sabah for countless generations.

Set amidst a lush landscape of mangroves and vibrant morning glories, this tranquil slice of island paradise offers a calm and reclusive environment for guests to completely unwind from the events of the day. Upon stepping inside this relaxing haven, your soul will feel completely at ease with the serene ambience that includes a glistening pond filled with brightly coloured koi fish and the soothing smell of scented oils wafting in the air. As



one waits for the bliss to begin, the spa attendants will be on hand to attend to your every need, which includes serving a delicious cocktail blend of lime, chilli and tropical fruit juices to help rejuvenate the senses.

Six treatment rooms are available, each complete with high ceilings, massive glass windows shielded by thick curtains and a private deck – the perfect spot for gazing out into the wilderness before being lulled to slumber by the soothing sounds of the crashing ocean waves nearby. Also located at the Spa Village is the Mangrove Theatre, a spacious area where one can participate in wellness activities such as yoga. Guests on the lookout for a unique experience can also sign up for the Sabah Scent Adventures, an educational session that involves learning how to create your own scent using pure essential oils.

After clocking in a couple of hours at the spa, it is understandable to feel afflicted by a sudden case of clinomania. For those who opt to dine in for the rest of the day, a quick call to the concierge to request for the **North Borneo Straits Tiffin** will help to satiate any hunger pangs. Priced at MYR300 per person, this private dining experience for two showcases a variety of local and western

delicacies, with each dish concocted based on the rich history that led to the development of the renowned Straits cuisine.

Included in this delightful feast are juicy satay sticks of stone-grilled chicken, beef and prawns; a seafood consommé with dumplings and vegetables; a selection of local delicacies presented in quaint ceramic tiffins; the Kalimantan Kolak Sago with sago pearls, sweet potatoes, palm sugar and coconut milk; and two shots of delightful lihing, a popular local aperitif made from yeast and glutinous rice. If you ask nicely, perhaps they might even sell you a bottle or two. Aramaiti!

BORNEO BEAUTY

If you're looking for a complete head-to-toe pampering experience, the Borneo Vanilla Orchid and Honey Cocoon at Spa Village Gaya Island will be more than worth your while. Designed to reinvigorate one's skin and hair, each session begins with a relaxing leg massage that takes place on a private deck which faces a mangrove forest. After a gentle exfoliating body buffing treatment that involves a delicious mix of crushed vanilla pods and yoghurt, the body is wrapped in a nourishing vanilla-infused honey cacao fruit masque. This is followed by an invigorating Indian scalp massage and a nourishing vanilla honey hair masque to add a little extra lustre to tired locks of hair. The entire experience ends with a blissful full body massage. Using a toasted 'coconilla' concoction, the masseuse will gently knead away your tired muscles. Each session lasts approximately two and a half hours. (MYR765 per person)

Upper Village Gondola, is a 300m pulsed gondola that is also the first of its kind to be housed at a Japanese ski resort. Besides allowing guests of Kasara Niseko Village and Green Leaf to access a beginners' area located on the mountainside of the latter, the gondola is connected to the top of the Village Express lift. For guests, this means a seamless commute around the central village, Niseko's contemporary lifestyle hub comprising townhouse-style buildings modelled after traditional wooden machiya. Behind the ornate lattice doors lies fine gourmet offerings and international designer fashion.

Both the Village Express and Upper Village Gondola will operate until 10pm during winter so that guests can enjoy the convenience all day, make time for an evening out or head to the slopes again for night skiing. During peak season (from Christmas through to Chinese New Year), the expanded night skiing area will also be served by the Mori no Chair lift. As if the offerings are not enticing enough, a new 1.2km ski run will also be in place. The course winds from The Green Leaf to Kasara Niseko Village, by the central village, and traverses a bridge towards Hilton Niseko Village. 



What's your favourite memory of your grandfather Lim Thye Hee, the Managing Director of the Majestic Hotel in 1932?

My grandfather was the most respectable, straightforward and honest person I've ever known. Despite being guite wealthy, he only rode a bicycle to work every day-this showed he was also a humble and modest individual. After moving to Kuala Lumpur from Singapore, my siblings and I stayed with him and each time we paid him a visit at the Old Majestic, we were only allowed to use the staff entrance and not the main grand entrance. I vividly remember sitting in his office and being asked to study, even during the school holidays. I used to feel so sleepy but I still had to push myself to study because he had always instilled in me the importance of education. Besides studying, my siblings and I would also have to make our own tea or coffee if we felt like having one. Although my grandfather ran the entire hotel, we were never once given special treatment and today, I appreciate whatever that he's done because it has made me a grounded and sensible individual.

Lim Heng Suan was the bookkeeper of the hotel in 1932. What do you remember of him?

He was actually the son of Lim Thye Hee and one thing that most people didnt know about him was that he actually had a permanent job with Sime Darby. So,

he only did the bookkeeping for the hotel after working hours or during the weekends. It clearly shows how hardworking he was as an individual. Also, most of the staff working for us at that time were from China. So, they hardly got the chance to visit places or enjoy good food. I remember him buying baskets of local fruits like durian once in a while and sharing it with all the workers. It was like a party for them and it gave him a fulfilling feeling seeing smiles on their faces.

Share with us your fondest memory of the old Maiestic.

Entering the Majestic filled me with total euphoria. I loved coming over to the hotel because it was so big and spacious, and it channeled a sense of opulence like never before. Those days, it was rare to walk into such a grand building, so having the chance to do so made me extremely happy. I particularly liked entering the Tea Room because it had very high ceilings.

I also got the chance to sip a cup of the finest quality tea and have it with scrumptious cakes and fruit prepared by the hotel staff. I don't think life got any better for a young girl like me at that time.

What do you think of the restored and revamped Majestic Hotel Kuala Lumpur?

Ever since YTL Hotels bought over the hotel in 2012, I've visited the place a couple of times. One thing that I really appreciate about the new Majestic is that they kept the Old Wing. Each and every part of the Old Wing brings back a particular memory of my childhood, so I feel extremely blessed that YTL Hotels decided to maintain the old building. As for the New Wing, I feel that it brings out the luxuriousness of the hotel even more. With its architecture, furniture and lighting, the new Majestic looks nothing short of magnificent. They managed to preserve the past in a classy way, especially the entrance. 

The cool air and picturesque mountainscape add to the charm, one that is made complete by the fairy lights that decorate the pine trees outside Cameron Highlands Resort every year when the festive season begins.

Festive Wonderland

Few places offer as much as Bath during the festive season. **Kim Inglis** discovers how history, architecture, shopping and a jolly good time dovetail perfectly in this UNESCO World Heritage City in south-west England.

During Georgian times, the town of Bath in the south-west of England was a favourite destination during the festive season. The so-called 'Bath Winter Assemblies' featured a special calendar of events at the Assembly Rooms from October onwards. Guests would arrive at six o'clock in the evening for an agenda of music, dancing, light bites, card-playing and conviviality – all in the stately, double-height ballroom lit by five magnificent crystal chandeliers. At 11 o'clock on the dot, the evenings came to a conclusion, with guests heading back to their lodges in carriages.

Now, as then, visitors flock to Bath at Christmas and New Year. These days, they come on the train, the station being conveniently located a five-minute walk from city centre. The evenings may not be so regimented and there is certainly more variety of venues and things to do – but the historic and festive atmosphere of the UNESCO World Heritage City at Christmas is as beguiling as ever. The town has some fantastic shops and a host of special yuletide activities, so it's the perfect destination for a winter break. From singing, shopping and shows to theatre, dancing and dining, there is a full spectrum of Christmas and New Year entertainment on offer in Bath.

One of the highlights of the season is the Bath Christmas Market, this year running from 24 November to 11 December 2016. Set against the backdrop of the beautiful Bath Abbey, it is regularly voted the most picturesque and popular market in the country. Featuring more than 170 decorated wooden chalets lining the streets alongside the Roman Baths, it specialises in high-quality artisan products – from local artworks, handmade Christmas decorations, bespoke jewellery and homeware, to festive food and drink, toys, accessories and even gifts for pets. Most of

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the stallholders are businesses from the south-west of England, making it a truly local affair.

Returning for a second year is the Christmas Lodge, an indoor venue reminiscent of a rustic snow lodge, located on Stall Street. Bath Ales serves heart-warming food, hot drinks, cakes and locally produced real ales here from 10am to 10pm daily. Boasting a marvellous festive atmosphere, it complements the musical talents of Bath's various entertainers — carol singers, musicians, street theatre practitioners and children from local schools singing their favourite Christmas songs.


In addition to the market, Bath boasts some wonderful shopping opportunities. Milsom Street, with the country's oldest department store of Jolly's, was a favourite in Georgian times with Jane Austen and her ilk buying fabrics, bonnets and buttons in its haberdashery department. This was invariably followed by afternoon tea in the beautifully appointed Tea Rooms with its full range of teas, coffees and snacks. In fact, the store has now been fully revitalised by owners House of Fraser and, once again, offers a unique shopping experience. Other stores, gift shops, art galleries, antique markets

and more radiate out from this main thoroughfare. With such a huge variety of goods on offer, it is also easy to shop as you never have too far to walk.


Many people specifically travel to Bath to buy antiques, either at the string of shops lining the so-called London Road, or at the Vintage and Antiques Market that takes place on the first and last Sunday of every month. Held in the historic Green Park Station, a listed Victorian building with a vaulted curved glass roof, it houses up to 60 different traders selling anything and everything antique. There's invariably a DJ spinning original vinyl, an organic juice bar and restaurant selling Sunday roasts, as well as some bargains on offer

For those with an interest in arts and crafts, there are a few specially organised festive workshops on offer in December. Lunch and flower arranging with Ston Easton florists, Elly Bayne and Jude White, bring out creative talents, while an evening of origami at the Museum of East Asian Art introduces guests to this ancient paper-folding technique. Akiko Wakefield, an experienced origami instructor, demonstrates how to make Christmas decorations and mini trees with a distinctively Japanese aesthetic. Another workshop, for the foodie-orientated, is a Christmas cake decorating class. Dates and times of workshops can be found at *visitbath.co.uk*.

At the heart of Bath – geographically, spiritually and in its sheer physicality – lies the magnificent Bath Abbey. Founded in the 7th century, it was reorganised in the 10th century and rebuilt in the













12th and 16th centuries; today, it is recognised as one of the largest and finest examples of Gothic architecture in the south-west of England. Edgar, the first king of England, was crowned here in AD973, and numerous kings and queens have visited since. Christmas is a very special time at the abbey, with midnight mass on Christmas Eve, as well as a schedule of Bath City Choir recitals and carol singing services in the run up to Christmas Day. Be sure to pop in and join one of these special choral events.

A crisp December or January morning is the perfect time for a winter walk in Bath. Choose between Prior Park with its famous Palladian bridge, the towpath alongside the River Avon where fishermen brave chilly winds year round for a catch, or the heritage Skyline. This walk through hidden valleys, woodlands and small meadows affords spectacular views of Bath city, the Mendips and beyond. And, as usual, Bath's Royal Victoria Park will be featuring its traditional ice rink this winter (until 3rd January) in its marvellously picturesque surroundings. All this outdoor activity will be bound to help you build up an appetite for the plethora of dining options available in and around the city. Gastropubs, wine bars, five-star hotels and more all organise a number of specials over the yuletide season.

The Pump Rooms adjacent to Bath Abbey will have some sparkling drinks receptions around the magical torch-lit Roman Baths, both in December and January. Or you can enjoy the 21st-century equivalent at the Thermae Bath Spa, where the thermally heated rooftop pool offers superb city views. These special mineral-rich waters are open until 8pm on Christmas Eve and New Year's Eve, giving guests a chance to relax before the big day. Carol singers in the Cross Bath are another attraction, and the Thermae Gift Vouchers make popular Christmas presents, perfect for a last-minute purchase if you're a little disorganised!

Just across the road at The Gainsborough Bath Spa, the five-star hotel is offering an all-inclusive two-night package over Christmas and a one-night package over New Year. Champagne, canapés, four- and five-course meals, and warming hot toddies are the order of the day (and night) here, and all guests can enjoy complimentary access to the Spa Village Bath facilities between 7am and 10pm along with 20 per cent off spa treatments. This hotel is the first in the country to have direct access to mineral-rich waters directly below the hotel – and its programme of hot dipping baths, Jacuzzis and steams is a real boon on a cold winter's day or evening.

And that's before we mention the special menus that have been devised by Michelin-starred head chef Johann Lafer: concentrating on local produce, they include braised shoulder of Mendip lamb, a traditional Christmas lunch with all the trimmings, and a New Year's Eve menu that includes ham hock and foie gras terrine, poached halibut and crab risotto with a lobster bisque, and a roast fillet of beef. On Christmas Eve, special escorts are on hand to guide guests to Midnight Mass and dole out hot whisky toddies and mince pies on their return to the hotel. With a special Christmas gift from Santa, movies and the Queen's speech in The Chapel along with other indulgences, you will be hard pressed to book something more luxurious in the city.

One of Bath's attractions is its accessibility. Everything is located close to each other, and it's never a schlep to get from one place to another. Little cobbled streets and alleys, lined with historic buildings in honey-hued Bath stone, give architecture buffs a real treat, while shopfronts are always decorated with special snowy scenes at Christmas. Just round the corner from The Gainsborough Bath Spa is the Theatre Royal, one of the oldest working theatres in Britain. Built in 1805, it has enjoyed an illustrious history - and continues to entertain visitors in a manner that has spanned more than two centuries. Specific to the UK's theatrical tradition is the Christmas and New Year season pantomine (or panto), a type of participatory theatre that is much loved across the country. With songs, slapstick comedy and dancing, as well as gender-crossing actors performing a story loosely based around a well-known fairy tale, the panto this year at the Theatre Royal is Aladdin. Running from 8 December 2016 to 8 January 2017, this story of the boy, the lamp and the genie is one of the most popular, a real delight for children and adults alike. Also recommended at the adjacent children's theatre, The Egg, is a production of Snow Mouse by the Travelling Light Theatre Company and swashbuckling spectacular in the form of Robin Hood. Visit theatreroyal.org.uk for more details.

Rugby is hugely popular in Bath and, luckily for sports lovers, there is a home rugby match on the weekend of 30 December 2016. The club offers a variety of hospitality options catering for parties from two to 100 people, so you can choose the friendly informality of the Riverview Suite or opt for a more traditional affair in the Ricoh Suite. Hugely atmospheric affairs, you'll be guaranteed some fine action on the pitch and the suites all kick off with the warmest of greetings from the courteous staff.

In fact, this is one of the real joys of a break in Bath: the congenial welcome you'll receive from the local population. Whether you're simply making a quick purchase or buying an expensive gift, it doesn't matter. Locals always have time to chat (in fact, you may well get their life history before you know it!), and they genuinely want you to enjoy the beauty of their very special city. With centuries of tradition, wonderfully preserved heritage buildings and streets, and a plethora of activities on offer, it definitely makes for an inspiring and relaxing winter break. **\textstyle{V}**

YTL Life speaks to Leong Yin Kit, Chief Executive Officer, and Prof Emeritus Tan Sri Datuk Seri Panglima Dr Abu Hassan Othman, Chairman of YTL International College of Hotel Management (ICHM), to find out more about the college that is growing steadily in Malaysia.

Tell us about YTL International College of Hotel Management (ICHM).

Leong Yin Kit: It was the objective of Dato' Mark Yeoh, who's the Executive Director of YTL Hotels and Resorts Division, to build an institute that will produce professional hospitality students that can embark on a career with YTL Hotels itself, upon graduation. So, in 2005, we started the college with just five classrooms that can accommodate up to 50 students at Vistana Hotel. Over the years, we started growing and in 2013, we moved to Starhill Gallery, where we are now flanked between two 5-star hotels - JW Marriott and The Ritz-Carlton, Kuala Lumpur. This was a big milestone for us as our students can now truly experience the world of hospitality.

Prof Emeritus Tan Sri Datuk Seri Panglima Dr Abu Hassan Othman:

We are a boutique international college that believes in creating professional allrounders for the hospitality industry. Since we are located at Starhill Gallery, we are privileged to be surrounded by renowned hotels, giving our students the opportunity to be placed in the real world (quite literally) from day one. Besides that, the students are also given the chance to be placed in different YTL Hotels, including both local and international locations, as part of their industrial training in the course. So, this is something great for them as they can get real-life work experience

under the tutelage of renowned individuals in the industry around the world. This is something that most colleges can't provide and we see it as our hallmark, in terms of student exposure.

ioin YTL ICHM?

Leong: The first thing that we tell our students when they join our college is that they're guaranteed a job at the end of their course. This is something that is not offered in most colleges and we can do it because of the support that we obtain from YTL Hotels. All our diploma students are given a supervisory position upon graduation. One thing that we do differently here is that we don't put the industrial placement, which is an integral part of our syllabus, at the end of the course. This means that students get a minimum of two placements at two different hotels, through the span of two and half years of their studies. This is extremely beneficial for them as they get real-world practical training from leading experts in the industry, Besides that, we are also associated with ICHM Adelaide for our Diploma in Hotel Management course. The syllabuses are taken from Australia and every year, ICHM Adelaide comes down for our graduation and grants our students an Advanced Diploma. With the Advanced Diploma, students are now given the choice to do their Bachelors degree in Australia for just a year.

Tan Sri Abu Hassan: Beyond that, what most parents would expect from a college is to provide quality and recognised education for their children. We are a Malaysian Qualifications Agency (MQA) certified international college, which is a must here. Apart from that, our partnership with ICHM Australia also ensures that the quality of education is world-class and is recognised in both Malaysia and Australia.

Proudest achievement?

Leong: For me, the proudest achievement has to be when we moved from our old campus at Vistana Hotel to Starhill

Gallery. We did it because we managed to increase our student count and today. we have about 360 students with us. In addition, we started our college with just the Diploma in Hotel Management. Then in 2013, we introduced Diploma in Culinary What can students expect when they
Arts and last year we added Diploma in Baking, Diploma in Event Management and Diploma in Spa Treatment. Seeing this kind of steady and positive growth has made me feel extremely pleased. Besides that, in 2014, our Diploma in Culinary Arts students were invited by the Swedish Embassy to participate in a competition, and I'm proud to say that we won the competition, despite being a new player. Our students were all in their first year and they were competing against third year students. Being named as the winner of the competition definitely made us hold our heads up high.

> Tan Sri Abu Hassan: It has to be seeing the rapid growth of students over the years. When we had our first graduation ceremony, we only had ten students and today we have about 360 students. Our most recent graduation that happened in August this year saw 167 students graduating. It was held at The Majestic Hotel Kuala Lumpur and I feel extremely honoured and privileged to be having the ceremony at such an exclusive venue.

Besides that, the entire event was planned by our second year students and I must say they did a wonderful job.

How do you ensure the student count at YTL ICHM is constantly on the rise?

Leong: We bring high school students over to our campus for field trips, in order to explain and educate them about the hospitality industry. By doing so, we try to instill the passion in them and hopefully. they'll join us after completing their high school. We are committed to doing this as we bring about two groups of students every month. Other than that, we also have YTL Hotels' leaders coming over to share their work experience and inspire them to start a career in this line.

What's next for YTL ICHM?

Leong: We are definitely looking at growing the school by recruiting more students. Since the industry itself is growing, it is only right that we train more professional and competent individuals to ioin the workforce in the near future. Also, with more students, we also realise that we need to provide a platform for them to further their studies. Therefore, we are planning to conduct our own bachelor degree programme. So, both of these are in our pipeline and hopefully will soon



The Green & The Blue

Bali's mountains and lakes are among the island's most underrated attractions. Simon Pridmore makes a case for the very volcanoes that Bali owes its existence to.

The Mother Mountain

where Bali's day begins, as the rising sun spreads its conical shadow over the plain below. Agung is an active volcano. It rises over 3,000 metres above the sea and is currently the largest of the string of mountains on Bali's spine.

The mountain's physical presence, albeit imposing, is nevertheless far exceeded by its symbolic importance to the people of Bali. For the Balinese, Agung is a representation of Mount Meru, the central axis of the universe in Hindu mythology. It is the home of Shiva, (written as Siwa in Bali,) and the central link in a trio of huge peaks transplanted by Shiva from the Himalayas to stabilise what is now the Indonesian archipelago. The other two mountains are Semeru on Java and Rinjani on Lombok, the latter visible from the slopes of Agung across the Lombok Strait.

mountain, Agung. Its summit is the highest significance. In Bali, the spiritual world



is closely entwined with daily life. Here, people do not talk of north, south, east or west. They refer instead to kaja, kelod, kangin and kauh. Wherever you are in Bali, the direction facing Mount Agung is kaja, and this is the most sacred and pure point on the compass. Generally speaking, if you live in the south, kaja is north-east: in the north, kaja is south-east. The opposite and most impure direction is kelod, facing away from Mount Agung and towards the sea. Kangin means facing the rising sun that evokes birth and beginning. Kauh is the direction looking west towards the setting sun, a symbol of ending and death.

The most important parts of a Balinese house, the temple and the bale daja, the raised pavilion where the family's most precious possessions are kept, are always located on the kaja side of the compound. Beds are positioned so that the occupants will sleep with their heads pointing towards the volcano in order to benefit from the beneficial forces emanating from Agung. Facilities such as toilets and pigpens are situated on the kelod side of the house.

Ancient Giants

Agung is currently the highest mountain on Bali but that has not always been the case. The island is home to three separate huge

volcanic systems and two relatively minor ones, whose growth over eons has given Bali its current shape and geology.

The island consists, essentially, of the slopes and lowlands of the three major peaks, with massed sand and silt (alluvial) deposits in the north and southwest, where the main tourist areas of Kuta, Legian, Seminyak, Canggu and Sanur are situated. A large elevated limestone island in the deep south, called Bukit Badung, is joined to mainland Bali by an alluvial causeway, and this is where Nusa Dua and Uluwatu are located. Other islands offshore, including Lembongan, Ceningan and Nusa Penida, are also elevated reefs, the visible part of a submerged shelf extending from the tip of neighbouring Lombok.

To put it another way: the map of Bali looks like a chicken facing west and laying an egg. The volcanic range is the chicken's backbone, the fertile lowlands are its belly, the alluvial deposits are the legs and Bukit Badung is the feet. The three islands off shore, of course, are the egg(s)!

Bali, as it is today, was created and shaped by the growth and subsequent eruption of the three major volcanoes. Agung is actually the smallest and most recent of the trio and is still relatively classically volcano shaped, a tall pyramid dominating the East Bali skyline. The other two are now only visible by subordinate peaks on the rim of their vast calderas and crater lakes.


It is their crater lakes by which the other two volcanoes are best known, as the cones of both were obliterated by cataclysmic eruptions in unrecorded times and all that remains are vast calderas. The more recent of these two systems, Batur, is still instantly recognisable as a volcano and, indeed, it is still active. It has erupted more than 20 times in the past 200 years. Ancestral Batur was approximately 4,000m high, nearly a kilometre taller than present-day Agung. The caldera was formed by two colossal eruptions, the first 29,000 years ago, the other 20,000 years ago.


The Batur viewpoint in the village of Kintamani is one of Bali's most popular tourist sites and iconic vistas. Visitors stand on the crater edge and gaze out at the lava field from the most recent eruption. A huge lake lies beneath the crater wall to the south-east and the small central Batur cone rises to the north in the centre of the plateau. The far side of the crater is 7.5km away in the distance. To the north-east, Mount Abang, Bali's third highest point, is a new volcano growing out of Batur's crater wall. The Batur cone is popular for sunrise treks, as its peak is free from forest cover, is relatively easily accessible and the summit offers spectacular views.

The Village in the Volcano There are hot springs near the crater lake and the village of Trunyan, a Bali Aga village, sits on its shores. The majority of Balinese

people today are descendants of the Javanese Hindu Majapahit, who invaded Bali in the 14th century and remained in control of the island until the early 20th century, even after the empire elsewhere was no more. The Bali Aga, or mountain people, are an ethnic minority that did not accept Majapahit ways and continued their traditional practices.

The ancient rites are followed to this day in Trunyan and one or two other Bali Aga villages dotted around the island. In one particular respect, the customs of Trunyan are utterly unique. Unlike the majority of Balinese, the Trunyan villagers do not practise cremation. Instead, after a ritual cleansing with rainwater, the body of the deceased is placed in a bamboo cage under an enormous 1,100-year-old banyan tree called the *taru menyan* (sweet-






smelling) tree and allowed to decompose naturally until only the skeleton remains. Then the skull is placed on a stone altar. The Trunyan cemetery is only accessible by boat. Experienced Indonesian travellers will immediately see parallels in the culture of the mountain people of Toraja in Central Sulawesi.

The Most Ancient Peak

The oldest of Bali's three major volcanic systems is one where the caldera is so huge and covered in greenery that most of the millions of people who visit the area every year do not even perceive it. Travelling due north from Denpasar, the road rises gently for a long way then becomes very steep, and you get views to the east of Bali's central plain below and Mount Agung rising in the distance. To the west, a number of smaller volcanic peaks reach for the sky. The lush vegetation everywhere conceals the fact that you are climbing up the ridge of the Buyan-Bratan volcanic complex, also known as the Bedugul or Catur caldera. The cones to the west are actually new volcanoes growing out of the south-western rim of the crater.

The eruption or series of eruptions that led to the formation of this enormous pit are thought to have taken place hundreds of thousands of years ago. Scientists believe that the mountain that once stood here, ancestral Mount Catur, would have been well over 3,000m high. There is no evidence of eruptions here in recorded time but there is still plenty of geo-thermal activity in the crater - there are over a dozen hot springs! Today, Bedugul is a very popular resort destination. It draws visitors because its elevation gives it a cool, fresh climate, which is very attractive to city dwellers tired of sweltering in the heat of the lowlands. Bedugul's three large lakes, Bratan, Buyan and Tamblingan, are the major features. Lake Bratan is a very holy spot for the Balinese and Pura Ulun Danu Bratan is one of the most photographed temples on the island. Viewed from the right angle, it can seem to be floating on



the water. Built in 1633, it is devoted to the there is a lot of activity around the Bukit goddess Dewi Danu.

second-largest lake, behind Lake Batur. It is guite shallow and is situated below the northern rim of the caldera. The third of Bedugul's lakes, Danau Tamblingan, is a smaller body of water. It is popular among hikers and there are over 30 The bed of the ancient caldera has temples dotting its shores. Buyan and Tamblingan used to be one body of water until a landslide separated them in the early 19th century.

Bali's Fruit Basket

The volcanic soils in the Bedugul area are prodigiously fertile and this deep bowl lays a good claim to be Bali's fruit and vegetable basket. Patches of crops take up almost every spare bit of open ground and you know you are in the right place when you start to see strawberry sellers lining the road. In the morning, especially,

> also proven to be the perfect spot to create the Bali Botanical Garden, one of only four official botanical gardens in the whole of Indonesia and a must-visit if you are passing through. It is not well signposted from the main road but, again, the corncob is your marker. From there, look for a large Balinese split gate and you will be on the right road. The garden is truly world-class. It has won a number of international awards and covers some 1,500 hectares, but getting around is easy with excellent roads and concrete pathways. It is even wheelchair friendly.


It is divided into a number of areas, featuring varieties of the main tropical plant species. There are patches of dark, mossy rain forest, open grassy conifer forest and palm groves. You will also find tall tree fern walks and herb gardens. Benches and gazebos are liberally provided so you can get off your feet occasionally. The Botanical Garden is not on the usual tourist trail, so there is a good chance you will have the place to yourself, except on weekends and public holidays, when there may be crowds of local people here.

To get the best photographs of the Bedugul caldera and its lakes, head north towards the mountain villages of Gobleg and Munduk, where plantations of cloves, coffee and cacao cover the slopes. The road will take you right along the edge of the crater for quite a few kilometres and there are plenty of places where you can pull over. Watch out for hungry monkeys!



DON'T MISS THE MOUNTAINS

Stepping into the bathing rooms, a large welcoming tub of antiaging herbal bath beckons you for a soak with its heady scent of green tea intertwined with ginger and sepang plants. For a good 15 minutes, you feel your skin becoming refreshed as your worries melt





away in this remedial brew of the Semai people that moisturises the skin while promoting blood circulation. Slices of kaffir lime sit in the bath, purifying the waters with their antioxidant rich juices also believed to remove negative energy. If you're up for some self-therapy, these lime slices are perfect for some self exfoliating along with sugar scrub and honey and tea scrub provided. It's a nice prelude for the thorough scrubbing yet to come. But before that is the relieving Minjau Asli massage. Working her hands deftly across the pressure points of your body, the skilful therapist rubs and kneads away at the knots that she magically notices. For over an hour, each physical pain is carefully worked away by the therapist's able movements using the special minyak Minjau- a healthful blend made with coconut oil, patchouli, tea and black pepper. The special oil blend with its intoxicating aroma alleviates mental fatigue along with physical fatigue as it is massaged into the skin with long, deep strokes.

WHO ARE THE SEMAI PEOPLE?

The Semai people are part of the largest indigenous ethnic group, Senoi or Orang Asli in Peninsula Malaysia, known for their gentle nature. Thought to be descendants of the ancient, original population of Southeast Asia, the Semai practice a huntergatherer lifestyle, depending on the richness of the forests to nourish them. Their diet mainly consists of mountain rice, wild boar, tubers, sweet bananas and vegetables. Your body is coated in a mixture of rice, green tea, jasmine and herbs such as turmeric and galangal that work together harmoniously to cleanse the skin, giving you a beautiful alow.

After every inch of your body has been scrubbed back to health with the therapeutic blend, it's time for one last refreshing shower. Patting yourself dry, it's a little sad knowing that the pampering has come to an end, but it's not quite over yet. Once dressed, you're guided back to civilization with a cup of herbal tea known as the Semai Fountain of Youth to cleanse your body on the inside. Flavours of the jasmine green tea, betel leaves and ginger dance on the tongue, pleasing your palate before working their magic to heal the body. As you quietly contemplate on the tonic brew and birdsong, you'll notice a lightweight feeling in your soul and a knowing smile on your lips. Why? You now have a secret as well.

The Rocks are right next to moonlit waters, while the sandy beach and South China Sea options are set in a romantic gazebo at the water's edge. For the barbecue, you'll be sited on a wooden platform surrounded by luxuriant jungle. Local herbs and spices, Asian and Western dishes, freshly-caught seafood, 'surf and turf' options and sweet homemade desserts are all part of the evening's repast. If you're interested in the stars,

you can view the serene East Coast night sky through a tableside telescope – and all options include a discreet service team, illumination from candles, moon and stars, as well as gentle sea breezes and lapping waves. You're made to feel special but you're also given privacy to allow you to truly savour your special loved-up evening.

Pangkor Laut Resort also offers similar experiences on the rocks or beachside at historic Emerald Bay or in a secluded nook on the sandy beach by the Fisherman's Cove restaurant. As at Tanjong Jara Resort, the emphasis is on romance, the fresh flavours of the sea, cocktails and canapés, and the last embers of the setting sun. Once again, chefs personalise the five-course menu according to guests' requests, and tables are lit by the flames of tiki torches and a bonfire.

Metropolitan Mollycoddling

If bright lights and big cities are more to your taste than secluded seaside surrounds, YTL Hotels is not short on urban options too. One particular location immediately comes to mind: the Orchid Conservatory at The Majestic Hotel Kuala Lumpur. The cocktails were the talk of the town; the food unrivalled. It was also extremely modern, with an Art Deco vibe, elevator, modern sanitation and that marvellous invention... airconditioning. An early advertisement declared it 'A Hotel of Preeminence' that was particularly known for 'its distinctive social atmosphere, its comfortable and up-to-date accommodation, its courteous service, and the excellence of its cuisine that has earned a reputation renowned among epicures'.

That cuisine has been revived today in The Majestic Hotel Kuala Lumpur's Colonial Café and can be sampled à deux at the Private Conservatory Dinner. Think classic prawn cocktail served in a tall glass, followed by Ayam Kunyit, a mild curry favoured by both colonials and locals, or Hainanese Chicken Chop, an old KL favourite. Desserts are no less eclectic: swiss roll that uses local kaya instead of fruit jams, English Trifle, and bread and butter pudding with Madagascar vanilla. A besuited waiter tends to your needs, while, all around, candlelight flickers, allowing the giant moth orchids to create shadowy winged silhouettes against the glass. It's a unique experience, one that could not be replicated in a different environment.





Cooking up a Storm

We've already mentioned the Cooking School at Tanjong Jara Resort where guests are introduced to the creative culinary heritage of Malaysia's Malay, Chinese and Indian residents. But another cuisine that is equally celebrated and loved by locals is the unique Peranakan one of Malaysia's Straits Chinese. The term Peranakan (translating as 'local born') refers to people of mixed Chinese and Malay/Indonesian heritage. Peranakans are descendants of Chinese immigrant traders who travelled (and later settled) in Nanyang from the 14th century onwards, and married local Malay women or Bataks from Sumatra. Their offspring, and succeeding generations, were also known as Straits Chinese, as many were born in the British-controlled Straits Settlements of Malacca, Penang and Singapore.

At **The Majestic Malacca**, an authentically restored 1920s Peranakan mansion turned heritage hotel, you are encouraged to learn about Straits Chinese culture through architectural walking tours, river cruises and personalised Cooking Classes. As with interior décor, clothing, customs and more, Peranakan food is a heady mix of eclecticism and exuberance. Combining Hokkien cooking methods with local ingredients such as chillies, coconut milk, *belacan* (shrimp paste), tamarind and lemongrass, dishes have a distinctive taste. Malay flavours permeate throughout, but you'll be amazed to see some imported English provisions in a Peranakan kitchen. As dedicated Anglophiles, the Peranakans were keen on products such as Bovril, Milkmaid condensed milk and Lea & Perrin's Worcester sauce!

At The Majestic Malacca's Cooking Class, a Peranakan Master Chef takes you through the basics, then teaches you how to cook some specific dishes you can eat later. Delving into the history of each exquisite recipe, you'll expand your knowledge of aromatic ingredients and cooking styles. Afterwards, you're encouraged to have lunch or dinner in the formal Mansion restaurant to savour the spoils of your toils. Hopefully, the dessert will be the eponymous Sago Gula Melaka – a dessert that tastes a bit like crème caramel, yet has hints of coconut and palm sugar as well – and is one of my personal favourites. Bon appétit!



In every city that The Ritz-Carlton calls home, the property undoubtedly becomes an icon, a landmark that lives up to an exalted reputation of classic luxury, elegance and impeccable butler service. The Ritz-Carlton, Kuala Lumpur is no exception. Since welcoming its first guests in December 1997, when it opened as the country's first luxury boutique accommodation, the 364-room hotel has never been short of accolades and admiration. Nestled within the Golden Triangle yet buffered against the city's well-known bustle and congestion, the hotel delivers on location – strategic, yet quiet – and impresses with its service standards. The Independent ranks it as one of the 'Top Five Butler Hotels in the World', Travel + Leisure recognises it as one of 'The Greatest Hotels in the World', while Condé Nast Traveler has welcomed it into their prestigious 'Gold List'. The hotel befittingly draws an esteemed clientele, from members of royal families and international celebrities to corporate leaders and heads of states, seeking a getaway that's the epitome of sophistication.

To many, The Ritz-Carlton, Kuala Lumpur already had it all but the hotel went on to show that you can improve on perfection. The entire property underwent a refurbishment that saw its guest rooms, suites, public areas and facilities completely updated. Fresh and modern were the buzzwords that characterised the 'new' hotel, unveiled in March 2016, underscored by the hotel's origins and staying true to its roots. The result is an exquisite haven cocooned in genteel grandeur, and a paean to timeless grace.

The hotel's essence remains untouched, with some adjustments introduced in order to elevate guests' experience. The ever-popular Sunday Roast continues to be a highlight of The Ritz-Carlton, Kuala Lumpur's culinary offerings, but where it used to be served in The Cobalt Room, it is now presented at The Library. Executive Chef Zaffar Bin Abdul Samad has made sure to retain traditional favourites on the menu, while expanding it so that even regulars have something fresh to look forward to.



Step inside The Library and you will be immediately lulled into that weekend state of mind as the soulful sounds of jazz, performed live by a trio, drift across the handsome space marked by timber floors and dark wood panelling. Bookshelves lined with various tomes form feature walls and the best tables come with plush, curved sofa seatings that are ideal for cosy tête-à-têtes. These surround the main buffet display, which forms the centrepiece, that's laden with scrumptious appetisers, cold dishes and decadent desserts. Flanking the ends of this table are arrays of shellfish, sushi and sashimi. On yet another table, freshly shucked New Jersey oysters come under a deserving spotlight as one of the most well-received delights in the spread of over 60 dishes.

Whet your appetite with crisp salads and Mediterranean dips, before diving into succulent prawns, sweet lobsters and plump mussels. Make room for cuts of gravlax, foie gras terrine and beef carpaccio before heading to the meat trolleys. The main stars are the signature roasts of lamb and prime beef ribs; melt-in-themouth tender, the carved slices of perfectly cooked meat are best enjoyed bathed in silky jus and served with roasted greens and Yorkshire pudding. There's not all to the brunch: A small selection of hot food complements the buffet, cooked upon order and served by attentive staff who will make sure your glass is never empty of champagne or wine. Pair them with the mushroom soup with truffle oil, baked cod fish or spaghetti with wagyu meatballs. Finish with some gorgeous gateaux, mille-feuille, cake pops and macarons from the sweet end of the spread or take your pick from the cheese cart.

The Ritz-Carlton, Kuala Lumpur's Sunday Roast lasts three hours, which gives you all the time to feast, imbibe and immerse in an inviting ambience that's made for upholding a classic English tradition – not at all a bad way to spend a Sunday. ■






The Perfect Brew

What does tea mean to the man who drinks at least nine cups a day?

It means refreshment, knowledge, comfort, friends and family. There's so much to it physically and emotionally as well. In the physical realm, there are the mindboggling varieties, blends, locations and flavours. On the emotional spectra, it's amazing how tea can cheer you up, calm you down and enhance each moment. What can I say, I'm pretty passionate about it - it's a big influence in making my day.

Fondest memory of tea?

I was about eight years old and we were doing a subject on geography in school regarding India and discussing the tea connection between the Britsh Empire and India. The geography master was well aware of my family's legacy and thought it would be better to have me at the front rather than at the back, asking naughty questions! So, I turned to my father for help and, in typical dad style, he got very excited and gave me some tea samples along with a thorough briefing. At the end of my presentation, we had a tea tasting and I'll never forget the expressions on my classmates' faces. Up to this point, all they knew of tea was that it's dark brown and you drink it with milk because that's how they saw their parents and grandparents do it. And I astonished them with white and green teas, and teas of unusual flavours. The penny dropped and, in that moment. I understood the significance between tea and my surname. I realised it would make my life very happy just teaching the world about tea. I decided to do just that and here we are!

What's the Twinings magic?

Our philosophy is to be totally committed to producing the highest quality teas and make them accessible to everyone. It's proven in our history with Richard Twining. who was a central character in creating The Commutation Act of 1784 that slashed tea taxes and made it affordable to all. From this philosophy, we have master tea tasters who we train ourselves and pass the knowledge down from generation to generation – it requires amazing skills to take different elements and make your cup

of tea taste exactly the same every time. We have a magic ingredient that runs, not just through me, but also our tea tasters and members who have a passion for what we do. We're all willing to go the extra mile to help satisfy the customers and the company is simply full of lovely and enthusiastic people.

afternoon tea?

In the early 18th century, tea became a fashionable drink over which aristocrats used to swap stories while alleviating pangs of hunger before dinner. Today, afternoon tea is all about sitting back in a very civilised and relaxed manner. Therefore, setting is very important with three key components: good company, delightful small and delicate food, and the choice of accompanying tea, of course. Proper tea-drinking etiquette dictates no talk of religion, politics or anything that will cause an argument.

What is life like as a tea ambassador for Twinings?

What excites me most is the reaction you get from people when you serve them a new type of tea: their eyes go big and they have that 'wow' moment. That doesn't always happen but when it does, it's a terrific feeling knowing that you've brought something into their lives that's going to give them many special Could you describe the perfect moments in the future. As I travel the world, and introduce the magic of tea, I often end with a poem that perfectly captures the relationship of tea and the Twining family: "It seems in some cases kind nature hath planned That names with their callings agree, For Twining the Teaman that lives in the Strand, Would be 'wining; deprived of his T'."

TOP SIPS

Stephen Twining's guide to the perfect cup of tea.

- 1. Quality of water is important. Use fresh, cold tap water or carbon-filtered water. Never use distilled water as it is completely devoid of oxygen. Tea gets its flavour from the dissolved oxygen water.
- 2. Warm up the teapot first before brewing. Pour in some hot water in a teapot, leave it for a minute or two and then pour it out.
- 3. Put in the tea leaves first. The old rule of thumb is one teaspoon of tea leaves per person and one more for the pot.
- 4. Pour in just boiled water. As soon as the water reaches its boiling point, take it off the heat and pour it into the pot. For every extra second it boils, precious oxygen is lost.
- 5. Let the tea brew. Different teas have their own brewing times. For black tea, let it brew for four to five minutes; regular tea about three; and green tea for three minutes with boiled water that has been cooled for about five minutes. Make sure to follow the instructions on the packaging for a most flavourful cup.
- 6. Stir the teapot before pouring because the tea leaves (which hold the most flavour) are at the bottom.
- 7. Additions: Historically, milk is poured first but adding it later makes very little difference to the flavour. Add some lemon to dark tea as it enhances the flavour terrifically and no sugar, please - drink it nature's way. The overpowering sweetness of sugar will mask the delicate flavours of tea.
- 8. Remember. No matter the rules, it's still your cup of tea drink it the way you enjoy. That's why it's the world's most personal drink.

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When Food Is Life

Executive Chef Jose Alonso of Binomio in Singapore demonstrates how the finest food is often the simplest.

A sumptuous selection of classic Spanish cuisine was the star of The Library in October. For only five short days, this quiet space, tucked within the elegant confines of The Ritz-Carlton, Kuala Lumpur, played host to a perfect culinary ambassador for Spain. Executive Chef Jose Alonso, who has worked with celebrated chefs like Santi Santamaria and now owns the popular Binomio in Singapore, was eager to point out that the finest food is often best served in its true classic form without need for embellishment or fancy techniques.

As such, the menu held a spread of Spanish offerings that was enjoyable for its honest authenticity and artful combination of flavours without any pretence to what it really is - well-prepared

and absolutely delicious food. A tray of tapas included a light and delicately crispy fried eggplant with a touch of honey that diners couldn't get enough of, only to be topped by chicken and boiled egg croquettes with a perfectly crispy coat encasing a velvety mash of meat inside.

The fried cheese terrine bikini, again, looked most unremarkable – after all, what's the fuss about what was essentially a slice of cheese sandwiched between two dainty squares of wheat toast? But no. Of course, Chef Alonso had to have his very own homemade cheese, whipped with a blend of olive and truffle oils to create an exquisite taste.

The star of the show was the sumptuous squid ink paella with seafood or Arroz Negro – not the most photogenic dish of them all, but a remarkably rich flavour that left guests desiring seconds. This Mediterranean inspired Valencian-Catalonian seafood special has always signalled Summer days but, here in Malaysia, where tastebuds are attuned to strong flavours, it was a fascinating

departure from the usual ways that the staple of rice is cooked and presented. A generous serving of barramundi, cuttlefish and clam were served on this perfectly cooked rice alongside a dollop of aioli. The dish was a joy to consume for its simple ingredients yet delicious blend of flavours. After all, the original recipe is known as arroz de pobre, or 'poor's man rice', a reflection of its modest ingredients.


"Spanish food is very honest and heartfelt, cooked with the freshest ingredients with time-honed skills," says Alonso. "It is very rich with various flavours as well as influences from our locality. For instance, the north of Spain, where the food is richer, or in the south, with Arabic influences such as spices like paprika and cumin that add an exotic touch, while classic Mediterranean flavours from Italy and Turkey can also be found. All of these translate into a unique cuisine that is becoming very popular nowadays. I just think my country is incredibly blessed with an abundance of good ingredients that go into the amazing richness of food we have – like seafood, meats, truffles, mushrooms and wines."

The difference was the absence of pork, which is usually found aplenty in Spanish food such as ham and chorizo. The chef made up for it with an abundance of seafood instead. "I've often been asked about my cooking philosophy," Alonso reflects. "To me, what counts most is 100 per cent flavour. Each and every ingredient must be fresh and ideal, as they all contribute to the dish.

"As chefs, we work a lot of hours, up to 16 on some days. I am 34 and I've been doing this since I was 18, and I've never stopped even today. My philosophy is doing what I love most. I cannot imagine doing anything else. I am lucky to have my own restaurant at my age. I miss time with my family or travelling, but when I'm in the kitchen, I don't want to be in any other place.

"It has all started from home, as my mum loved to cook. We didn't go out to eat much and the quality of food was always high in my home. Meals were never something casual or quick. We never waited to have good meals at special celebrations. My mum would select choice ingredients. My dad also owned a wine retail shop. So, we drank a lot of good varieties of wine and it's important alongside good food. We are all used to this kind of lifestyle, and I had an elderly neighbour who'd still cycle to the morning market to buy fresh herbs to grind into his very own pesto, something he'd been doing for 50 years!
