



In a recall of AC Hotels' origins, travellers may also kick back with Spanish vintages and a food menu inspired by tapas. An ever-revolving roster of Malaysian-inspired tapas are paired with the burgers, classic fish and chips, and a choice of churros and crème catalana as sweet endings. In this harmonious space, the lounge and its accompanying bar become the kinetic centre of the hotel for quests seeking a chic space in which to unwind.



THE RITZ-CARLTON, KUALA LUMPUR ELEVATES THE ART OF AFTERNOON TEA WITH ITS VERY OWN CERTIFIED TEA SOMMELIER.

e it jasmine, oolong or Earl Grey, the delicious teas served at The Ritz-Carlton, Kuala Lumpur's famous Ritzy Afternoon Tea go beyond the ordinary. Its signature tea is a blend of green oolong with a delicate creamy palate, while a selection of tea's grand classics run the gamut

of English Breakfast, Classic Orange Pekoe and Heaven & Earth, with the last of the lot being a tart sencha with the sweetness of strawberries and kiwis.

The hotel's lobby lounge invites one to spend languid afternoons in the comforting ambience of floral decorations, plush sofas and lilting music. And just as you are about to sink into your next reverie, a steaming pot of tea arrives to deliver new sensations.

Enter Sally Cheah, whose two decades at the hotel began with gourmet cakes, desserts and beverages. Her passion in the art of afternoon tea led her to the grand tea houses of Paris, London, Tokyo and Singapore, where she observed the finer points of afternoon tea traditions. This training included a sojourn in Mumbai, where she obtained a TeaMaster Silver certification as a tea sommelier from the owner of Ronnefeldt Teehaus, whose teas are served at the The Ritz-Carlton. Kuala Lumpur's afternoon teas. As manager of The Lobby Lounge at The Ritz-Carlton, Kuala Lumpur, Cheah is a regular sight for guests who partake of its famed three-tiered assortment of savouries and sweets. Its finger sandwiches are a recall of The Ritz London Book of Afternoon Tea, with accompanying pies and quiches. Then there are its scones, baked within an hour of service so as to be served warm and fresh, served with Devon clotted cream.

The tea easily complements the array of handcrafted bites, with aromas released together for a flavourful symphony. From the Earl Grey, one gets a hit of bergamot, while the jasmine tea possesses the perfumed nose of its namesake, conferring a relaxing finish to a lemon éclair or Breton fruit tart. The range of handcrafted desserts from the afternoon tea also includes highlights such as opera cake, strawberry cheesecake, Victoria sandwiches and vanilla millefeuille.

Meanwhile, more robust flavours of tea such as Sweet Honeybush and other black teas - Spring Darjeeling (harvested in spring from the Himalayas' southern slopes), Imperial puerh (best when infused in boiling water), and spicy Masala Chai – highlight the umami and spice of the savoury teatime components. From the scotch eggs and chicken pie to the egg mayonnaise and smoked salmon sandwiches, the right tea pairing will bind the flavours with a liquid alchemy to create a new journey of gastronomy and tea appreciation. To finish, one could enjoy the fruit-infused teas of soft peach with a nose of bourbon vanilla, or perhaps, a relaxing peppermint or a Fujian white Pai Mu Tan tea – plucked by hand before the leaves open to evoke the freshness of white peonies.

Perhaps there is some wisdom that makes tea the second most widely consumed beverage in the world (after water). "Its inherent benefits and interactive qualities also have a positive effect on people's moods and overall health," muses Cheah, adding: "and that makes it a popular choice in the afternoon, for those who have to eat their dinner sober."




Colonial buildings and centuries-old architecture are common sights in Malacca. State-wide, there is a drive to protect and repurpose these historical structures, and the buildings that are successfully conserved will stand out and be admired for generations. The Majestic Malacca is one such building.

As soon as guests step into the grand, white building that is The Majestic Malacca, they will feel the presence of the city's glorious past throughout the hotel, from the original 1920s porcelain tile floors of the Straits Settlement mansion – a distinctively Peranakan aesthetic – to its helpful kebayaclad staff.

The friendly staff will gladly show you to the bar that's tucked away at a corner of the lobby. There, ask the bartender for a Tanqueray's Malacca Gin and sit back to marvel at the amazingly well-preserved building, while sampling the exclusive limitededition tipple. Opposite the bar, stairs lead to The Mansion where authentically and delicately prepared Kristang cuisine is served. These dishes are from the small but tight-knit Portuguese-Eurasian community, descendants of Portuguese settlers in the 16th century for whom Malacca was its prized outpost in the spice trade. Kristang delicacies are not easily found in restaurants, but they are an important nod to the diverse communities that call Malacca home.

Then, retire to the hotel's luxurious guestrooms complete with teak furnishings and rich draperies that hark back to the glory days of the old city.

Sit on the plush silk-upholstered chaise lounge and gaze out at the river, sipping tea and letting your imagination take you to the heydays of the port city teeming with Chinese junks and spice-laden vessels coming ashore from all over the world.

A WANDER THROUGH TIME

uch ink has been spilled on Kuala Lumpur's (KL) built heritage, and even more gigabytes on the Internet. The capital's historical details are profusely shared online, like the tiniest pixels of an 8K Ultra HD screen when what you really want to see is the whole picture, for real.

To begin to know KL is to be close to its heart, and the only way in is on foot, preferably with someone who grew up hugging its pavements as a boy, loving the city as it yielded up to him its innermost secrets.

Enter the ebullient Sharezal Abdul Wahid, director of concierge at The Majestic Hotel Kuala Lumpur, history buff and sage storyteller on The Majestic Colonial Walk. We'll follow him on this auspicious morning and feel the mighty morphing energy of one of Southeast Asia's most fecund cities, where the past resounds into the present.

Exempli gratia: Sharezal attended Victoria Institution (VI), the secondary school founded in 1893, partly seeded by surplus funds to commemorate the golden jubilee of Britain's Queen Victoria. One of VI's original 12 trustees and founders was Loke Yew, the tin miner and philanthropist. Loke Wan Tho was his youngest son, whose estate built the original Hotel Majestic in 1932, the national heritage building that is now part of The Majestic Hotel Kuala Lumpur.

We steam into the city and Sharezal tells us we're on KL's historic mile; Jalan Sultan Hishamuddin was once Victory Avenue, named for the Allies' success over the Central Powers in World War One, thousands of kilometres away in the cold, shell-shocked and bloodied European trenches.



And because KL was the exotic equatorial outpost of the Empire's global export operations; the destination invariably became a plum posting for expats, fizzing like colonial primordial soup. A hop, skip and jump away from The Majestic Hotel is Kuala Lumpur Railway Station, which was completed in 1910 to replace Resident Station (so named for its proximity to the residence of the British High Commissioner). Its architect was the prolific Brigadier General Arthur Benison Hubback, who was at the time the British architectural assistant to the director of public works. Hubback deftly proceeded to blend




Previous spread: a bird's-eye view of the rich colonial-era architecture surrounding The Majestic Hotel Kuala Lumpur.

Neo-Moorish, Mughal, Indo-Saracenic and Neo-Saracenic styles into the catchall Indo-Gothic architecture that was de rigueur across India and crown colonies stretching eastwards. 
Diners can select three types of seasonal fruits or fresh berries to make their own smoothies or opt for the highfibre, potassium-rich Almond Booster – a blend of almond milk, Thai bananas, peanut butter and cacao nibs. It's a tasty accompaniment to Sea Salt Shack's Dark and Sweet açai bowl – with its dark chocolate chunk inclusions, Greek yoghurt and toasted almonds – and Chao Lay avocado toast, which arrives topped with lump crab, Peruvian peppers and green mango.

If it's a taste of the sea that you're after, Hawaiian-style poké bowls provide a refreshing combination of raw fish, sushi rice and moreish accompaniments like local mango and edamame. Otherwise, make a beeline for the build-your-own savoury bowl centre, where you can select six ingredients to be tossed together. Grilled grain-fed beef tenderloin, marinated tofu or white tiger prawns go very well, for instance, with fresh corn, candied walnuts, a yuzu-miso dressing, and – best of all – a generous handful of crispy chicken skin.

The fun doesn't stop once the sun goes down on Wednesdays because this is when Sea Salt Shack rolls out the sunset seafood beach barbecue – an altogether more lavish spread. Along with a raw seafood bar, a seared-to-order mini crab cake station, a paella of the week (cooked over an open fire), a raw seafood bar and a sushi and sashimi display, there's a selection of charcuterie, cheese and antipasti to whet guests' appetites. Gourmands will rejoice at the sight and taste of the butcher's block carving station that showcases barbecued chicken and braised short ribs. And with a wood fire grill that sears rock lobster, sea bass and local mussels to perfection, this will certainly be the dinner to beat.


AS THE ROMANS DO

HEAD CHEF STEFANO PINGUE EXPLAINS HOW GARUM, THE WESTIN PERTH'S SIGNATURE RESTAURANT, NOW OFFERS A SCINTILLATING TASTE OF ROME THROUGH FRESH WESTERN AUSTRALIAN PRODUCE.

ucked within the historic Hibernian Hall in Perth City's East End is a little corner of Rome. Garum is a collaboration between Australian chef Guy Grossi (popularly known as Melbourne's Italian emperor) and The Westin Perth. Despite the fact that this osteria

is separated from the Italian capital by a distance of over 13,000 kilometres, Garum has done well melding ancient Roman techniques with modern Roman classics since it opened in 2018.

"Indeed, we face a tyranny of distance to Europe, where the variety of raw materials is absolutely unmatched," agrees head chef Stefano Pingue. "However, what we lack in proximity to Rome, we more than make up for in the exquisite fresh produce, meat and seafood available here in Western Australia. We are an Italian restaurant, but the specific characteristics of ancient Roman cuisine are unusual, so it's a process of research and discovery as to how to combine the traditional flavours with the best seasonal produce that Western Australia has to offer.

"Some of my favourites include Fremantle octopus, scallops from Geraldton, duck and quail from Wagin, Angus sirloin steak from the Great Southern region and our signature Arkady lamb – I could go on!" At the time of writing, Pingue has just put the finishing touches on Garum's new à la carte menu and fans of the restaurant are aching to know what has made the cut. "I try to do as much research as possible to remain within the realms of ancient Roman cuisine – Garum's guiding philosophy," he explains.

"Many different nationalities and influences have passed through Italy during ancient times and it is often necessary to dig a little deeper to understand the true roots of the recipes. We'll definitely keep some of our signature dishes, including our ever-popular Arkady lamb, but there will be some movement in the menu that reflects the changing seasons." One thing's for certain, though – the famous breakfast that has guests at The Westin Perth and brunch devotees flocking to Garum will remain a fixture.

This formidable spread brings out the glutton even in those who would normally show restraint. Those who've tasted Garum's breakfast will attest that they've rarely savoured better. As Pingue puts it: "Guy has always been adamant that he does not want to offer the same breakfast as many luxury hotels. Our concept is based on the traditional Italian-style breakfast called *tavola fredda e tavola calda*, which translates to 'the cold table and the hot table'. You have a large selection of hot and cold dishes which are changed seasonally, along with the delicious à la carte breakfast menu.

"We strive to maintain the same high standard every day thanks to our amazing team, who all work together with the same enthusiasm for providing interesting, delicious and unique breakfast offerings that we can be proud of – not only for hotel guests, but for anyone who'd like to experience something a little out of the ordinary."

here's no chance of missing Melbourne Marriott Hotel – superbly located on the corner where Exhibition and Lonsdale Streets meet, it really is at the centre of everything. The five-star hotel's prime position within Melbourne's CBD, or central business district, means that it's a hop, skip and a jump away from the Victorian capital's most popular history, culture, shopping and nightlife destinations.

If your boots are made for walking and you feel like taking in the sights of the city on foot, here are some interesting places to amble to – and it won't take you more than 20 minutes.

STATE LIBRARY VICTORIA (7 MINUTES AWAY)

First established as the Melbourne Public Library in 1854, this is Australia's oldest public library and one of the first free public libraries in the world. Exhibitions, talks, and guided tours – both paid and free – are frequently scheduled here. While there, take a peek into the magnificent octagonal, six storey-high La Trobe Reading Room.

THE VICTORIAN ARTISTS SOCIETY (9 MINUTES AWAY)

Within this American Romanesque building, erected by architect Richard Speight in 1892, The Victorian Artists Society provides a home to the state's avant-garde artists of the future. Eager art collectors will enjoy dipping into the public gallery, while budding artists can attend an untutored life drawing class.

THE OLD TREASURY BUILDING (10 MINUTES AWAY)

Instantly recognisable as one of Melbourne's finest 19th-century structures, the Old Treasury Building hosts the original vaults

where gold bullion was once stored during the gold rush era. Don't miss its extremely entertaining ongoing exhibition, Wayward Women?, about 10 infamous Victorian women who made a name for themselves between 1894 and 1904.

PRESGRAVE PLACE (12 MINUTES AWAY)

If you're not in the mood for rubbing shoulders with tourists but still want a dose of street art, Presgrave Place, close to Melbourne's fashion precinct, is peppered with intriguing threedimensional works. There are sculptures, dioramas, framed images and even Banksy-inspired rats perched on the bricks to enjoy.

FLINDERS STREET STATION (16 MINUTES AWAY)

Should a native Melburnian instruct you to meet them 'under the clocks', they're referring to the row of 13 clocks above the main entrance of Flinders Street Station. They've been an icon for the city since they were installed in 1909. Today, the station serves as a popular meeting place, even in the age of instant messaging.

COOKS' COTTAGE (17 MINUTES AWAY)

The charming heritage-listed Fitzroy Gardens are worth a walk, but within the garden is a cottage built by the parents of British explorer, Captain James Cook. Originally constructed in Yorkshire, England in 1755, it was transported to Melbourne by Sir Russell Grimwade in 1934 and painstakingly rebuilt brick by brick – a considerable labour of love.



t's simple enough to traverse Brisbane by foot, but what about putting your arms to use and getting a markedly different view of the city instead? A mere six minutes away from the centrally located Brisbane Marriott Hotel, you find Riverlife Adventure Centre. From here, you can access the adventures on the Brisbane River – the longest river in south-east Queensland – which runs through the centre of the Australian state's capital city. This serpentine river, which originates some 350km away

at Mount Stanley, wends through the city with curves that are a tonne of fun to navigate and offer a myriad of sights.

In the 19th century, when Brisbane was a penal colony, the natural bend in the river (known by some by its Aboriginal name 'Maiwar') presented an enormous challenge for any would-be escapees. Today, those meanders are part of the Brisbane River's charm as evidenced by the many cruise boats, water bikes, paddleboards and kayaks on the water on any given day.

Riverlife - an Australian company with over 15 years of experience in leading guided adventures in Brisbane specialises in kayak tours, offering day tours as well as a slightly more sophisticated kayak, wine and grazing experience. Although Riverlife hires kayaks to those who are confident enough to do some solo paddling as well, it's far more memorable to join one of its group tours, which are led by a fully qualified guide.

First-timers needn't be anxious as the guide will take everyone through a safety briefing before dispensing tips and tricks on how to kayak. The tour then proceeds either downstream towards Brisbane's iconic Story Bridge or upstream to the South Bank, depending on the tide times. Before long, you'll be marvelling at sights such as the Queensland Maritime Museum, Kangaroo Point Cliffs and a shipwrecked steamship called Myora, which has been peeping out from the riverbank's mangroves at low tide since it was abandoned there in 1956.

Small parties can cosy up with sharing plates, running the gamut from Japanese shrimp tempura and Spanish gambas in garlic oil to French beef stew and Chinese spring rolls. If it's something local you're after, order a Dutch favourite – *bitterballen* – a bite-sized beef and gravy meatball croquette best enjoyed with a cool beer.

These finger foods also go superbly well with the bar's speciality cocktails, such as the refreshing Scheveningen Sunset – a mix of Bacardi rum and Havana three-year-old rum, orange juice nectar and grenadine. Another must-try is the hotel's twist on a classic, The Gallery Mimosa – a sugar crust-rimmed concoction of cava, orange juice and grenadine – which makes an invigorating sundowner. A range of Starbucks coffee is also available to enjoy on the premises or on-the-go.

For a heartier bite, there's the Marriott Burger – a 200gram flat top beef patty topped with cheddar, bacon, tomato, pickles, lettuce and homemade sauce – or the Marriott Chicken – a Peruvian-style grilled chicken with tomatillo, country bread and a spicy green chilli sauce. The Great Room's mushroom risotto, cooked with seasonal vegetables and nuts, and beet and ricotta salad with orange supremes and a honey rosemary vinaigrette, make for delicious meat-free alternatives.

Satisfy your sweet tooth with a decadent tonka bean crème brûlée topped with chocolate ice cream or the beloved Dutch *citroencake*, a traditional lemon cake served with white chocolate earth and a herbaceous basil ice cream for balance.

KACHOU FUUGETSU

JAPAN'S POWDER MECCA OF NISEKO WELCOMES THE COUNTRY'S FIRST RITZ-CARLTON RESERVE IN THE FORM OF HIGASHIYAMA NISEKO VILLAGE.

he Japanese phrase Kachou Fuugetsu was coined around the 15th century and directly translates as 'flower, bird, wind, moon'. Its deeper meaning, however, reflects a near universal concept in which you discover yourself through experiences in nature; in the joy and happiness attached to the passing of seasons - from an autumnal breeze to a pale winter moon. More than half a millennia later, this idea of going back to nature to heal and refresh remains as appealing, if not more so, as ever.

Kachou Fuugetsu becomes the keystone at the newly opened Higashiyama Niseko Village, a Ritz-Carlton Reserve, the first Ritz-Carlton Reserve in Japan. Located at the base of Mount Niseko Annupuri, which is part of the larger Niseko United ski area, the resort is composed of 50 luxurious rooms and suites, and is set amidst the stunning geography of Hokkaido's western province. Here, the changing of seasons confers a unique quality and colourful kaleidoscope to Higashiyama Niseko Village, which is open throughout the year, with Mount Yotei providing a magnificent background. present today in the resort's beverage portfolio that includes inviting après-ski cocktails served at the resort's Ume Lounge.

With the help of the resort's experts, the fascinating facets of Kachou Fuugetsu are within easy reach. This assortment of masters of their realms includes the Do San and the Higashiyama Reservists. The Do San is a trusted and dedicated service expert who personifies the Reserve service for each guest at Higashiyama Niseko Village. Aptly named in honour of



the locale and its history, Do San means a person of Hokkaido. The Do San add cultural value to the Reserve experience by sharing their love of place and are storytellers who look for organic opportunities to share local knowledge and traditions. The Do San oversee every aspect of your stay through this single touchpoint. Always available but never intrusive, the Do San ensure that your needs are anticipated and met in a way that is seamless and seemingly effortless.

The Higashiyama Reservists are select experts for the mountain orientation programme, curated exclusively for quests of Higashiyama Niseko Village. Higashiyama Reservists have an intimate knowledge of the local environment and natural wonders that make Niseko such a remarkable destination. These local experts have been skiing and snowboarding these mountains, cycling these roads and running these trails for years; their deep understanding includes relationships with and access to Niseko's surrounding farms and the famed produce that is coveted by Japan's best chefs, as well as the most unique onsen where the volcanic mud provides an elixir for the skin.

For the epicureans, the *itamae* at the cedar counter-topped Sushi Nagi becomes the gateway for you to uncover the bounty of the seasons through its Hokkaido gastronomic odyssey; expect prized hairy crabs in summer, sea urchin in autumn, and year-round Kuroge steaks and prime cuts, derived from the Japanese Black, one of the most prized breeds of local cattle. A particularity in this area is the coveted Yukinoshita (under-the-snow) vegetables, where produce is harvested just after first snowfall, thereby allowing it to reach its optimal level of sweetness.

Of course, the allure of the 2,191 acres of ski terrain is never too far away, or, if you may prefer, skiing, sledding, snowshoeing and snowmobiling. These winter adventures begin with mornings at Yukibana, where handcrafted pastries and creative local and international breakfast offerings set you up for the day. Then you step out into the wonderland of snow, in one of the world's most celebrated powder territories. Here, the confluence of geography, ambient temperatures and elevation has led to the Niseko powder phenomenon a triumvirate of snow quantity, consistency and quality unlike anywhere else in the world.



The powder hounds at Higashiyama Niseko Village will enjoy their own private locker where warm ambient air circulates to dry ski gear and boots after a day in the snow. A host of guest services provides a hassle-free experience to hitting the slopes, with priority lane access to the main gondolas, equipment waxing and tuning services, experienced physiotherapists on-call for any injuries or massages, as well as ski-in/ski-out access to the slopes connected to the network of chair lifts that transport you right to the peak of Mount Niseko Annupuri. From here, you have all of Niseko's deep powder backcountry ski trails for your choosing.

Back at the resort, a fitness centre equipped with state-ofart cardio and weight training machines helps you get in form. Following all that activity, the spa beckons with its signature shiatsu massages as does its onsen, with therapeutic waters drawn deep from thermal springs and piped in at 42 degrees Celsius. All around, the nature-inflected attractions at Niseko are weaved into the tapestry of your Higashiyama Niseko Village experience, with seasonal Haskap (blue honeysuckle) berries – a fruit traditionally consumed as a health elixir by the indigenous Ainu of Hokkaido - to the use of essential oils at the spa: lavender in summer and mint in winter. And in all this. that sense of Kachou Fuugetsu is synced to your inner being, bringing forth natural revelations in an extraordinary place.



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TL Hotels now has a whisky to call its own, for a little while at least, as it is a limited edition of just 150 bottles. These are of Adelphi Glenborrodale Batch 6, a blended malt from one of Scotland's most acclaimed whisky bottlers and a specialist in matters of rare

malts. The full run of Glenborrodale Batch 6 consisted of 1,496 bottles, and the 150 labelled specially for YTL Hotels are the last available. The eight-year-old blended malt, which is a dark gold, is drawn from two sherry butts and delivered at 46 per cent ABV. The tasting notes are evocative of a creamy sweetness that is best described as a summer Scottish breakfast with buttered oatcakes and heather honey. Flavours include dark cherry, white peach and kiwi fruit compote, and hazelnut spread on welltoasted drop scones.

Its winning qualities are its depth in flavours which are finely honed, maintaining a balanced nuance without overpowering the palate. A distinct lack of peat makes it more approachable for novices and connoisseurs, with the absence of smoke making it an easy and enjoyable dram at The Glasshouse Hotel, which is where one finds this rare elixir.

The Glasshouse in Edinburgh is a whisky destination in its own right, known for the whisky-themed naming of its 17 suites. Its bar, The Snug, is home to an impressive collection of over 160 Scotch malts, which one can enjoy by the bar's fireplace. The hotel's association with Adelphi began when The Snug's drink offerings were mapped out. The Snug, which has become the cheerful heart of this hotel with the facade of the 170-year-old Lady Glenorchy church, has benefited from the Scotch whisky passion and tradition of its neighbours, including Antonia and Alex Bruce from Adelphi who enjoy a burnished reputation in the whisky world as experts in the art of bottling Scotch whisky.

As a result, the hotel found its spiritual link to Scotch and the resulting whisky - which bears the YTL Hotels name on its label - shares many values with the hotel group; a familyrun business focused on producing a world-class product and lasting memories.

The new YTL Hotels whisky may be found behind the bar at all five of its UK properties, which include The Academy and Threadneedles in London, The Gainsborough Bath Spa, and Monkey Island Estate, Bray. The Glasshouse, however, remains a premier destination to sample this dram with bona fide whisky experts on hand to illuminate and advise. "My preferred way to drink it is with a wee bit of ice, allowing the flavour to develop and change as it melts and the water infuses with the whisky," says hotel general manager Tom Gibson. "Needless to say, my favourite spot is in a warm cosy environment, like The Snug with its welcoming fireplace!"



FLORAL FANCY

THE SECRET TO MONKEY ISLAND ESTATE'S CHARM LIES IN ITS THOUGHTFULLY DESIGNED GARDENS.

nen you reach Monkey Island Estate, its soothing atmosphere immediately takes over. This private seven-acre countryside retreat in the village of Bray is just over an hour from London, a distance that is far enough to leave

behind the city vibes and welcome life at a more leisurely pace. The property is influenced by nature and wildlife by the River Thames, where walnut, chestnut and lime trees surround the island, lending it some privacy, while thoughtfully placed flowerbeds paint the landscape in an assortment of colours.

The island houses two Grade I-listed buildings, structures of historical importance which are protected. The Pavilion and The Temple were built by the Duke of Marlborough in 1723 as a fishing retreat. These buildings have now been repurposed to house guest rooms and suites, ballroom and event spaces, a bar and a brasserie. The estate's new owners, YTL Hotels, commissioned Dorking-based Adding Value Design to create new gardens that would offer a romantic and sensory experience for guests. The result is a stunning vista of traditional herbs, flowers, trees and perennials, perfectly complementing the historic buildings.

Rectangular yew-hedged beds filled with white and green hydrangeas and blue agapanthus contrasted by pleached hornbeams flank the path leading up to The Pavilion. Throughout the gardens, flower beds add a dramatic flair through the clever use of colour and block planting amidst the sprawling lawns. A prairie-style winding walkway takes guests to The Floating Spa, a bespoke traditional barge that is the setting for the spa

inspired by the healing rituals of the monks who once lived in the area. The calming corridor features a mixture of coneflowers, bonesets, Culver's root, yarrows and golden oats, which come into full effect every summer. These botanical beauties act as visual cues, preluding the spa's array of treatments and therapies that harness the power of ancient remedies, British organic products and the gentle sound of the River Thames.

Surrounding The Temple, where most of the guest rooms are situated, are more hydrangeas, only this time with purple vervains and white phlox plants, while slender Italian cypress trees grow alongside them. Here, the outdoor seating area is the perfect spot for relaxing or even sipping a cup of tea. Sitting here at sunset can be an especially heady experience. With the fading light and the perfume of blooms, you cannot help but be at ease and marvel at the spectacular display of nature's beauty.

t the UNESCO World Heritage Site that is the city of Bath, a new addition to its famed The Gainsborough Bath Spa hotel offers guests an opportunity to holiday in style. The Romans duly named this spa town – as it were – Aquae Sulis in her honour. Over time Cross Bath, which was the exact site, has seen various iterations; as the foundation for St John's hospital in 1180 to a bathing pool for royalty and eventually, a historical edifice by Thomas Baldwin, known to the world as the 18th-century architect of the city of Bath.





In the present day, guests checking into The Townhouse will be welcomed with a complimentary bottle of champagne, fresh flowers and daily turndown service. Three bedrooms furnished with a king, queen and single bed accommodate up to five guests. Inside The Townhouse, guests will discover charming interiors with a treasure trove of authentic Georgian antiques. Among the highlights are its silk linens and curtains found in the master suite, and a copper bathtub.

A fully equipped modern kitchen, six-seat dining area, lounge and outdoor patio cater to your every whim. You may elect to whip up delicious feasts for the family, to dine in residence, replete with gorgeous chinaware. Or perhaps to enjoy drinks with friends in the vibrant drawing room, where a Bang & Olufsen television and accompanying sound system lets you catch the latest movies and sporting events.





hreadneedles Hotel, part of Marriott's Autograph Collection, is a fivestar boutique property in London's financial district that was formerly the London City and Midland Bank. Inside, there is a beautiful stained glass dome in the foyer that dates back to 1856, an old-school bar with lots of ambience and a heart-stoppingly grand restaurant with Grecian columns and a menu by Marco Pierre White. I stayed in the Livingstone Suite on the second floor and was delighted to find in the cosy sitting area a chilled bottle of Veuve Clicquot, a bar of handmade chocolate with a 19thcentury image of the bank foyer, and a copy of Nicholas Booth's account of the 1873 bank heist, called The Thieves of Threadneedles, on the coffee table. But what took

the cake was the witty voucher for a complimentary glass of wine at the Champagne Bar in the form of a City Bank credit note! After changing into something smartly casual, I decided to visit the Bar for a drink

before dinner. The impressive wine list and cocktail menu meant that I had a Grey Martini and a Chaplin all before dinner.

I was called to my table when it was ready and the buzz of dinner conversations and the clinking of glasses made me scan the menu with famished eyes. Bad boy chef White had managed to be true to the legacy of Wheeler's Oyster Bar and Seafood restaurant as well as entice a discerning diner with his take on modern British dining (without the hype). I started with half a dozen Colchester oysters with a glass of Gavi




Occupying an entire floor, the 125sqm Penthouse offers a time-traveller's view of London, from classical Wren churches to 21st-century skyscrapers.

di Gavi, followed by a creamy plump stone bass on a bed of perfectly braised fennel and rich lobster sauce. The Cloudy Bay Sauvignon Blanc went with the stone bass like velvet gloves on a lady's hand. Dessert was rich burnt custard richly spiced with vanilla seeds. After my meal, I drank an espresso martini as a homage to the English crème brûlée.

The next day, a brisk walk around the neighbourhood took me past The Scalpel to Leadenhall Market, where Harry Potter scenes were filmed (I now understood why there was a copy of a Harry Potter novel in my suite) and back again to the Gherkin. I wanted to visit the Tomb of the Unknown Roman Girl who was buried in the fourth century AD where the Gherkin skyscraper now stands. The remains of this 13- to 17-year-old were discovered in 1995 when excavation was being done for the Norman Foster building.

Walking back to Threadneedles Hotel that afternoon, I was peckish from my stroll and looked forward to my afternoon tea beneath that beautiful glass dome. So if you're a little tired of life, a stay here will revive your spirits and reignite your appreciation for the good life.

The aptly named The Library at The Academy provides the perfect creative space for small meetings and intimate gatherings in the heart of Bloomsbury.

Once a month, local book clubs, such as the London chapter of the Girly Book Club, meet at The Academy in the evening to have a book discussion over cocktails. You can find out when such meetings are held by enquiring at Reception.

There is also a carefully curated selection of Englishlanguage classics with the theme of travel to be found in The Library next to the lobby. These Penguin clothbound editions include Wide Sargasso Sea, Alice's Adventures in Wonderland, The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn, The Odyssey, Gulliver's Travels and Villette. 1. MEET THE COLONIAL PAST AT THE JIM THOMPSON TEA ROOM

Fifty-three years later and the disappearance of American businessman Jim Thompson still leaves lingering questions. The one certainty is that Thompson used to have his tea at the colonial mansion – now Cameron Highlands Resort. What better way to spend the day than having good lunch eats or teatime treats with a dose of mystery?







2. TAKE A STROLL ON THE JIM THOMPSON **MYSTERY TRAIL**

Did Thompson get lost that March afternoon in 1967? Did he fall? Cameron Highlands Resort's resident naturalist Madi will answer your questions while he takes you on a forest walk close to where Thompson was last seen. 5. ADMIRE MASTER CARVINGS AT THE MAH MERI ART GALLERY


This is a unique collection of the Mah Meri, a group of indigenous people who live on Carey Island, which is a 90-minute drive from Kuala Lumpur. The Mah Meri are well-known for their skill in turning abstract folklore into beautiful and tangible wood carvings that are incredibly tactile, as you'll be able to see at this gallery.



6. PICK A PACK OF PRODUCE AT THE FARMS

There is good reason visitors to Cameron Highlands flock to fruit farms; they can be quite fun, even with the crowds. Go to bigger farms so you needn't use your elbow to get to the succulent strawberries. Alternatively, visit lavender farms where you'll get to sample purple ice cream made from the blooms.


9. EXPERIENCE HOT POT GOODNESS AT GONBEI

12. GET THE CHILLS AT LATA ISKANDAR

This waterfall is typically the last stop for visitors as it is closer to the foot of the highlands. Go past the crowds that congregate at the souvenir shops and fruit stalls, and go in for a walk. Wet your toes in the cold mountain water and relish in the tingling that quickly follows.
